#### **FAW Board Retreat Focuses on Club Goals**

On Saturday, July 12<sup>th</sup>, six FAW board members met for several hours at the Fremont Bank Brookvale Board Room on Decoto Road in Fremont. Our new president, Shirley Scott, facilitated the meeting. Goals were discussed in six different areas:

### Membership:

- Provide a place to help members reach their writing and publishing goals. This will be accomplished through speakers, genre groups/critique groups, workshops, and other special programs.
- Increase membership by 10% per year and broaden our demographics. One way this will be done is by strengthening our electronic presence.
- Encourage an increase in the number of volunteers in the club. We will appoint a Volunteers Coordinator. A Volunteers Appreciation Dinner is planned.

#### **Programs:**

- Set up structured genre groups starting with the August 2014 meeting.
- Encourage critique groups to form out of the General Meeting genre groups.

- Support National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo) which takes place in November. After the month is over, we will celebrate those who met their writing goals.
- Hold an Agents and Producers Day. Volunteers will be needed to organize this
  event
- Standardize the General Meeting Agenda starting in August.
- Hold a writers workshop once a year targeting a specific genre or topic.
- Suggestion Box. Make available a form for suggestions from the membership.

### **Publicity:**

- Find a website gatekeeper.
- Find a Facebook administrator.
- Encourage members to submit news on their writing and publishing accomplishments, articles and stories to the newsletter.

#### **Finances:**

We currently have a healthy bank account to fund the programs we presently have. If we want to provide more and different programs, the budget will have to be increased. Additional funding may be obtained through fundraisers. Suggestions need to be made for how to go about this.

#### **Community Outreach:**

With an increase in the number of volunteers, we can host writing contests, speak to college students, and do other types of outreach.

#### **Social Gatherings:**

**Besides** the annual Holiday Party and CWC Picnic, ask for suggestions on what the membership would be interested in doing.

## Keeping Readers Reading Author Susan Lakin Saturday, Aug. 23, 2014 2-4 p.m.

How do you keep readers eager to see more of what you've written?

Easy! Make it memorable.

Susan Lakin, novelist and writing coach, makes a return visit to Fremont Area Writers on Saturday, Aug. 23, to show how to do just that. Her topic: "Creating Unforgettable Scenes That Really Cook."

She is the author of fourteen novels – six contemporary, seven in the fantasy/sci-fi genre, and one in historical Western romance. Her most recent book, due out this summer, is the historical western romance "Colorado Hope" written under the pen name of Charlene Whitman. It is the second book in The Front Range Series.

In a busy year so far, she has also written "Say What? The Fiction Writer's Handy Guide to Grammar, Punctuation, and Word Usage." The book is available in print and ebook format.

Lakin spoke to Fremont Area Writers in 2012, offering tips on how to use cinematic techniques in writing.

Workshop: Sizzling Scenes: Creating Unforgettable Scenes That Really Cook:

This lighthearted workshop fills a need for writers of all levels to explore the various ways scenes can be constructed and the elements needed to make a scene sizzle. Good writers are like good cooks—using a variety of ingredients and spices, simmering until boiling, and leaving a surprise twist or lingering aftertaste to keep the reader wanting to come back to the table for seconds. We will look at the three major components of a scene—the beginning, middle, and end - and judge, at random, excerpts from best-selling novels to evaluate what works and doesn't work in their scene construction. **Susanne Lakin** (C. S. Lakin, author name) works professionally as a copyeditor and writing coach, and is a member of numerous editing and writing groups. She also guest blogs on the top writing blogs, such as Writers' Digest and Jane Friedman, and teaches workshops and runs or participates in critique teams around the country. Her writing background and experience includes her having penned fourteen novels, nine of which she has contracted to publishers in the last three years. Her relational drama *Someone to Blame* won the 2009 Zondervan First Novel Contest at Mount Hermon Writers' Conference and earned her a publishing contract and five-figure advance. She currently has a seven-book fantasy series for adults with AMG/Living Ink Publishers. The first six installments are already in print. Her new release, *Colorado Promise* (under the pen name Charlene Whitman) hit best-seller lists in Historic Western Romance in its first month.

Her blog Live Write Thrive won the top ten blogs for writers in 2012 and 2013 by Write to Done (out of more than 1,100 blog nominations) and provides year-long instruction for novelists with exciting, fresh courses in weekly posts. She has also compiled her first two courses into nonfiction books (soon to be in print and ebook): Writing the Heart of Your Story and Shoot Your Novel: Cinematic Secrets to Supercharge Your Story. Her book Say What?: A Fiction Writer's Handy Guide to Grammar, Punctuation, and Word Usage released in February 2014 and remains at the top of the Amazon charts for writing reference books in grammar and editing.

Susanne comes from a background of screenwriters. She grew up reading scripts and working on TV series development with her mother, an award-winning screen writer and television producer. She was also influenced by her stepfather, a TV director and producer, and her brother, a TV producer and screenwriter. The rich influence of script structure influences her novels, and she utilizes many screenwriting techniques to construct scenes. Both workshops delve into the secret of how to "show, don't tell." These workshops can be adjusted for lengths of one hour to three hours.



34 Ways to Draw and Paint a Cat By Jan Small



One day my art students needed some more supplies. After art class, we all went down to Michael's art Supply store. I found a beautiful little sketch book, filled with 34 sheets of heavy watercolor paper. It was on sale for \$2.49. I felt compelled to buy it, not knowing what I'd do with it.

Back in my studio, I noticed a small ceramic cat I had purchased a few months prior sitting on the table. I decided to photograph the cat and trace it onto each sheet in the sketch book.

I challenged my creativity by seeing how many different ways I could draw and paint the cat. A book (I have the book if anyone is interested to see) is the result. The pages of cats are organized just as I drew them. I'd finish one, then wait for the inspiration for the next one. Even after I finished the book, inspiration kept coming.

I have added a section at the end of the cats that tells the title of each cat and any explanation I felt might be necessary. Also added at the end of the book are 2 cats waiting for you the reader to create.
