Everyone has a story to tell. But too many people can't see past the obstacles in telling it.

That's the belief of Donna Marie Ferro, who is the next speaker for Fremont Area Writers on Saturday, March 28. Her topic: "I Can't Believe It—I Wrote a Book."

Ferro is the author of "Italy, the Embracing Circle: Il Circolo," published by Xlibris. The book grew out of her grandparents' stories and her trips to Liguria in Northern Italy. The trips became journeys of self-discovery that culminated in a memoir. In addition to adventures and misadventures, she tosses in Italian recipes, tips on

packing, and a glossary of specialized words in Genovese.

Two of Art Carey's short stories are scheduled to appear in anthologies in April. The story of a high school girl who hides her homelessness will be in Main Street Rag's "Creatures of Habitat." A story about a man who learns about sympathy after being injured while bird watching is scheduled for "By the Bay," published by Bay Area Library ePublishers.



Nancy Curteman's fifth mystery novel, "Murder on the Seine," is out. Published by Solstice, it is available on <u>Amazon.com</u>. She's currently working on her sixth Lysi Weston mystery, this one set in San Francisco.



In January, Carol Lee Hall placed as a semi-finalist in the Kairos Prize Screenplay Contest for her feature-length script *Mordecai: Based on the Biblical Book of Esther*.

In February, two of Hall's projects placed in the semi-finals of the Nashville Film Festival Screenplay Competition: *Donaldina: Based on True Events in the Life of Donaldina Cameron* in the Historical Feature category and *Mordecai* for Inspirational Feature. As a semi-finalist, Hall won a Silver Laminate Pass worth \$250 to the festival in April. If either of her scripts moves on to the finals, she will win another pass.


