ou've almost finished your book. You want to sell it, but how? Not enough people know who you are for your phone to start ringing with publication offers. You've heard that you can make more money per book selling online with Smashwords or Amazon, but they barely push your book. Almost no one will know it exists unless you can get the word out.

So now what? Do what other writers have done. Go to seminars on marketing. Learn from one of the best!

On Saturday, March 23, 2–4 p.m., **Fremont Area Writers** will feature author and writers' consultant **LeeAnne Krusemark** who'll discuss book-marketing options, including internet sites where you can post your work for free.

As Adjunct Professor of Publishing and the owner of her own home-based consultancy, Krusemark has spoken widely on the business of writing. She's worked in the news media as a writer and editor, written numerous "How-to" books for writers, some of which will be available for sale at the meeting.

# February's Speaker Recap

# LESSONS IN LITERARY LAW

Presented by Kelley A. Way, Esq.

"Every author should know their rights in relation to their work. This presentation looks at five areas of the law—copyright, trademark, right of privacy and publicity, defamation, and contracts—and talks about how to protect your rights in these areas while avoiding infringing on the rights of others." ur February speaker, Kelley A. Way, Esq. is an expert in copyright and trademark law. She was very clear that in order to protect our rights, we must first know what our rights are, then we need to take steps to give our work the maximum protection possible, and finally to actively enforce those rights.

She covered copyright law in great detail, starting with its purpose: to promore creativity and ensure that writers profit from their work.



While explaining what copyright is, Kelley listed the rights conferred by the law: Reproduction (making copies), Derivative works (merchandizing), Distribution (selling), Public Performance, Public Display, and Public Transmission of sound recordings, and spent time discussing each in detail.

The copyright section of Kelley's presentation generated a great deal of interest and many questions. To protect our work that we are publishing in print or online, she recommended registering with the Copyright Office (www.copyright.gov); a requirement if you ever need to file a copyright infringement lawsuit. Kelley also suggested policing the internet to keep an eye out for infringement violations as one way to keep track of our work, and to first send a "cease and desist" letter if we find violations. She also shared information with us about how to avoid having copyright infringement lawsuits filed against us; covering what's "usable" and what's not...think public domain. To illustrate various subject areas, she shared some fascinating legal cases with us to help us see the real application of the law in both copyright and trademark lawsuits.

After Trademark Law, she covered Rights of Privacy and Publicity, Defamation, and Contracts. She had so much valuable information and there were so many questions that the meeting ran over.

Kelley summed up with reminders to make sure we have written permission to use a person's name, likeness or work product, and to make very sure we know exactly what we're agreeing to when we sign any contract. She promised to come back and cover Contracts in more detail in the future. 



I've learned from guest speakers what an elevator pitch is and how to deliver one, why it's important to have an internet platform if you want to sell books, and the legal pitfalls of writing. One of my favorite speakers was Andy Weir, who discussed how he promoted his book *The Martian* before it became a best-seller and led to a movie.

The best information about getting published I've ever gotten came at a California Writers Club gathering in Berkeley. While I was chatting with another writer and mentioned that I write science fiction, he said, "Oh, you must belong to Duotrope." Huh? Duotrope's website lists hundreds of publications looking for writers. It's where I start seeking a home for short stories and humor.

At our meetings, I've met successful and would-be writers. *Wear nametags, people!* Some joined critique groups and became friends. Writing is a lonely task and knowing other writers share your struggles is encouraging.

FAW gives back to the public, too. I've joined other members and talked to high school creative writing classes in Fremont and to senior citizens in assisted living facilities in Union City. Our branch has sponsored several high school writing contests in which members act as judges.

One of the best ways to get to know people in an organization is to volunteer or be an officer. Jump right in!

# Dave Strom Creator, Writer & Performer of Super Holly Hansson

s a kid, Dave M. Strom devoured first-run episodes of the Adam West Batman and first print runs of "Spider-Man." He started employment as a software programmer, then a technical writer. His goofy letters were printed in the Cal Poly student newspaper and in the San Jose Mercury News, where he twice won the Silver Pen Award. In the magazine Amazing Heroes, he wrote Strom's Index, a takeoff of Harper's Index. (Square feet of glass shattered per year by The Question's jumping through closed windows: 23. Of "X" number of ninjas, number Batman can knock out before being wounded: X-1.)

When the book *The DaVinci Code* came out, Dave started writing a satire of it. That went nowhere except for the female lead, Holly Grail, who punched villains, got superpowers, and faced several supervillains at once like Rooster Cogburn in True Grit. Dave renamed her and now writes superheroine slapstick about Super Holly Hansson and her super friends and fiendish foes. Dave's dog, Sweet Pea, loves listening to him read about Super Holly's adventures!

His short stories are printed in *Fault Zone Transform, Fault Zone Uplift, Carry the Light* in 2016 and 2017, *Scripting Change,* and *Series 1963 A: An Anthology of California Writers*. He published *Super Holly Hansson* in *Super Bad Hair Day* on Kindle. Two of his audio stories won first prize at the San Mateo Country Fair Literary Contest.

Dave performs his stories at open mics, where he loves doing evil laughs, over-the-top characters, and a few funny accents. On January 24, 2019, Dave was the headliner at San Jose's Caffe Frascati's Live Lit open mic. He performed the "Intellecta Rhapsody," where Super Holly gets into a big argument with her boyfriend's super-car (Batmobile-body, HAL-like computer brain), and then she must team up with it to stop an Edward G. Robinson gangster who stole a giant super-tank. He had fun and got 50 bucks.

Dave needs to finish a novel or three. He's working on that.


