If you're thinking about writing and publishing a book, but have no idea how to make that happen, join Fremont Area Writers at 2:00pm on August 28th, for Becoming a Published Author: *From beginning to end ...and beyond*.

FAW will be gathering on Zoom to listen to Chris Cook, who's about to publish his first book, a sci-fi novel; Evelyn Kohl LaTorre, who's in the final stages of publishing her second memoir; and Urmila Patel, who has just published the second in her memoir series, as they share their individual experiences from story concept to signing published copies.

The three authors will comprise a panel on the process of writing, publishing and promoting a book. While this is Chris's first book, he has been working on his manuscript development for several years and is now making his way through the process of finding an agent and a publisher. Evelyn is still busy promoting her first book, *Between Incan Walls: A Peace Corps Memoir*, published in 2020, and is in the final stages of publication on her follow-up book, *Love in Any Language: A Memoir of a Cross-Cultural Marriage*. Urmila Patel's first book, *Out of Uganda in 90 Days*, a memoir, was published in the spring of 2019; she has just published her second memoir, and is now promoting it. They'll explain the steps to take and obstacles they encountered once they'd completed their manuscripts and were ready to publish and sell their books.

Hear from authors that you know, about their individual journeys from writer to published author and beyond. Sometimes, before you've done something, it seems impossible; but once you've done it, you've proven to yourself and the world that you can! This is the perfect opportunity to be inspired to start your own journey.

NorCal Report

The NorCal Zoom meeting got rolling on time with about fourteen in attendance. Roger Lubeck, our new CWC President attended along with Sandy Lynn Moffat, the CWC membership chair. They, along with Carol Bumpus the NorCal chair, reiterated the need for training of the membership chairs and treasurers of the local branches. They assured us they are available to help with group or individual training for these officers.

The "Building Better Branches" conference was discussed, as well. This is another opportunity for training branch leadership that has been successful in the past. It is hoped that this all-day workshop can be held inperson sometime soon, but this has yet to be determined.

San Francisco Writer's Conference is scheduled for February 17-20, 2022. CWC will participate once again. NorCal will plan for it at our next meeting on November 6, 2021. Think about being a volunteer at our CWC table—this opens the door for you to attend some of the conference for **FREE**.

Many branches are looking forward to meeting "in-person" again soon. Most are planning hybrid meetings of "in-person" mixed with either zoom or YouTube recordings of the meeting. A majority of the NorCal branches are planning picnics in August, as a first step toward "in-person" meetings.

It was suggested that the person responsible for scheduling speakers for each branch should communicate with others doing the same thing in other branches. One branch takes a quick "on a scale of 1-10" poll of their members at the end of each speaker's presentation to determine if they would recommend that speaker to other branches. This allows their branch to easily and quickly recommend their favorite speakers.

Roger would like each branch to tally the number of books that their authors have published, so he can, in turn, know the number of books published for all of CWC. This works hand-in-hand for the branches to "Celebrate" author publications.

There are a lot of good things coming together through NorCal's efforts to improve all the branches of CWC.

June Speaker Recap

Kelley Ann Way, Esq. Legal Q& A for Writers

One of FAW's favorite guest speakers is attorney Kelley Way. This June, Kelley was once again our speaker. This time she fielded questions from our members. With the exception of one or two questions relating to taxes, which Kelley explained were best addressed by an accountant familiar with relevant tax laws, she answered all of our most pressing concerns. Here are some of those questions and her answers.

"What to do when Hollywood comes calling?" Kelley made it very clear: DO NOT TO SIGN ANY CONTRACT CONCERNING THE USE OF YOUR CREATIVE WORK, WITHOUT FIRST READING AND UN-DERSTANDING THE RIGHTS AS SPELLED OUT IN THE DOCUMENT. If you are not given sufficient time to read the contract or have your lawyer look over it for/with you—walk away.

Someone shared a story with the group about a writer who, under pressure, made the mistake of signing a contract without reading and fully understanding what it said, and her work was used to produce a pornographic film. There was very little the author could do about it, because she'd signed the contract. The moral of this story...read the contract before you sign it and if you don't understand it, there are lawyers who will, and they can help you. Kelley reminded us that contracts are negotiable and did suggest we think about how involved we might want to be in the making of a movie from our book or story, should we ever be in that situation.

Most of the questions were related to trademark and copyright laws. Someone asked if a pen name could be covered by trademark protection. Kelley recommended that we research a pen name before using one we like. If it's already being used, she suggested we consider choosing something else.

While this is something a lawyer familiar with copyright and trademarks can do for you, it is possible to do this research on your own. She recommended starting with a Google search of the pen name under consideration. To verify that something is actually a registered trademark or patented, check with the US Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO.gov). A trademark that is registered will be there, whether it's text, art (a logo), or a photograph.

Even if the name or logo is not on the USPTO.gov site, Kelley cautioned us that if someone is "building that pen name or a logo in the marketplace," even if not officially registered, their long-time use of it might out-weigh our use or desire to use it. In addition to longevity, the court might give consideration to whether consumers would be confused by the similarities. Again, these are situations where you might want seek an attorney's help, or just choose a different pen name or logo altogether.

You can register a trademark online, at USPTO.gov, but Kelley suggested that it helps to know what you're doing, and again recommended this might be best left to an attorney. Copyrights are easier, but she reminded us that you can't sue someone for copyright infringement without having your material registered.

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June Speaker Recap (continued)

Basic rule of thumb on registering: patents must be registered (\mathbb{B}), trademarks ($^{\text{M}}$) are optional, copyrights (\mathbb{C}) must be registered, if you're going to court.

What if someone is violating my copyright rights? How would I know? This is not easy, though with regard to your name, you can Google yourself once a month and see what comes up. If you discover that someone is using your name or your work without permission, you can send a "cease and desist" letter. The Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA) covers digital piracy and has a "take down" notice that can be sent to anyone violating your rights online. It also requires anyone with a website to designate a person to deal with DMCA complaints.

We touched briefly on music and character names. If you're considering using music as is, get permission from the record label if you want to use a particular recording. If you intend to revise a piece of music, get permission from the composer/song writer. Occasionally, characters are registered; Mickey Mouse and the Batmobile are examples of these. Recipes are not copyrightable because they are considered formulas.

Sometimes publishers go out of business, and we need to know what rights we retain if this should happen. This should be included in your contract. In general, you would want your copyright rights to revert to you. In addition, the definition of "out of print" should be included in the contract, especially in the case of print on demand publishing.

Kelley also covered "public domain" for us again. Anything written before 1925 is now in the public domain, and can be used without permission or concern with regard to copyright infringement. Copyright duration is the same for art and photos as with written work. Anything created after 1978 is covered by copyright for the life of the creator plus 70 years. Anything created before 1978 is covered for 95 years. You can consult an attorney or other professionals about copyright "clearance and permission," if you decide you need help with this.

Once again, Kelley was generous with her knowledge and time, and helped us better understand the legal aspects of being a writer and a published author. Just remember one thing...never sign a contract without knowing and understanding what's in it! **I·S**

I've come out the other end of this ordeal never having gotten sick, and in fact being healthier than I've been for ages. No contacts, no colds. My doctor said there's hardly any flu around also. I felt hale and hearty.

I met a friend walking her dog. She had been vaccinated also, so we could talk to each other, not that close, but not six feet apart, without masks. Almost like normal people, not explorers of some strange alien world with a dangerous atmosphere. I felt human.

I no longer ask, like they did in WW II gas rationing times, "Is this trip necessary?" I can drop into the store. We can go to the thrift store for fun. Maybe even a restaurant some day without fear of spreading the virus or getting the virus. The world has opened for me. I feel like part of it.

Best of all, we can start planning visits to our kids and grandkids. Zoom and Skype are stopgaps, but nothing like sitting on the floor playing with the four-year-old and snuggling with the one-year-olds. I feel like I have a real, not TV, family again.

I knew getting vaccinated would make me safe, I never expected that it would make me whole. Medicines sometimes cure more things than you imagine they could. I feel good.

Celebrating Marion Lee

March 8th was National Women's Day. While other people celebrated the accomplishments of famous women like Harriet Tubman, Marie Curie, Susan B. Anthony, or Anna May Wong (look her up if you don't know her), I'd like to celebrate my mom, Marion Lee.

Mom passed away on March 8th of this year. Even though she recovered sufficiently from COVID and COVID-related pneumonia to be released from the hospital, her body just gave out at 97 years. We will be planting a lemon tree in her memory because she loved lemons.

Marion was part of The Greatest Generation. She worked at the Oakland Army Base doing clerical work during World War II. She married and had three kids of her own and raised two of my cousins. When I was in junior high, she started working for the Parent Child Development Center in Oakland doing office work. She retired in the late 1980s and enjoyed traveling to Europe, Asia, and North America. She even took care of her own finances up to her early 90s.

Mom had a great sense of humor. Whenever someone asked her how old she was, she'd say, "I'm sweet sixteen and haven't been kissed—lately!" In her sixties, she recorded her own phone answering machine message in a sexy voice and said, "At the sound of the beep, tell me EVERYTHING. Bye, for now."

My mom was very pragmatic. One of her favorite sayings was, "Do what you can today, for you never know what tomorrow brings." I think that helps me not procrastinate. When my sister told her she would not be returning to her assisted living facility after her last hospital stay, but instead moving to a nursing home, she said, "Well if that's where I have to live, that's where I have to live."

She always welcomed our friends to the house. Many of them were second generation Chinese whose parents spoke broken English. They were surprised my

The House on Mango Street

by Sandra Cisneros

The House on Mango Street begins with a prefatory dedication: "A Las Mujeres"---which means "To the women." This is exactly what the book is about: the sufferings and abandonment of women in a patriarchal culture. It's also about the possibility of hope and joy. It's an easy, brilliantly crafted novel that became Sandra Cisneros's signature work. Within these brief pages, the main character, Esperanza (which means hope), struggles with familial and social obligations and expectations—as she observes her *amigas* walk down the traditional path to escape and security marriage—only to learn that this solution can create more problems than it resolves. It is psychologically and mythologically deep, with a Pietà scene when she holds her father who is grieving the loss of his own father, and a mystical encounter with the three fates of ancient Greece disguised as three tias (aunts). She deals with the sad alienation of the foreigner, and the burden of sexual predators. Some could call this a coming-of-age novel; in any case, it should be called a masterpiece. I enjoy this book for its themes, its depth, and its truth about the issues of our times.

I Recommend D.E. Stevenson:

One of My Favorite Authors

Ink Spots has requested book and movie reviews, but I would like to offer you a suggestion for a favorite author. My love for D.E. (Dorothy Emily) Stevenson's wonderfully witty and extremely addicting works began quite randomly about 40+ years ago while I was literally just browsing through the Sunnyvale library searching for an interesting

book to read to Anita as part of our "story time" sessions. I happened to be in the "S" fiction aisle, and noticed a series of books that started with the words "Mrs. Tim...." Well, we love to discover new (to us) series and often take any opportunity to try out unfamiliar authors and themes.

This happened to be a series based on the diaries of the author, who was encouraged to publish them, as they were so delightful, as well as witty and captivating. So, she changed the names, and did just that! They were so popular, that she went on to write a multitude of wonderful works that intertwine characters and keep you laughing and crying, and hoping you will run into the characters in forthcoming stories, which you often do as they show up as a neighbor or distant relative as you voraciously pour through the ensuing novels. We, of course, have collected almost her entire work, and truly missed the people we'd met along the journey, once her wonderful talent left this world for whatever came next for this excellent Lady.

Below is her bio as found on Wikipedia, it's quite a heritage.

Stevenson was born in Melville Street, Edinburgh, Scotland, on 18 November 1892. Her father was David Alan Stevenson, a lighthouse engineer and first cousin to author Robert Louis Stevenson; her mother Annie Roberts.^[2] A commemorative plaque, marking the house where she spent her childhood, was mounted at 14 Eglinton Crescent, Edinburgh in 2016.^[3] She began writing at a young age but hid her efforts because her parents and governesses disapproved. Her father refused to send her to university, lest she become a bluestocking.^[4]

In 1916, Stevenson married James Reid Peploe, a captain in the 6th Gurkha Rifles. [4] Her 1932 novel Mrs. Tim of the Regiment, which describes her life as a British army wife, [5] was based on her personal diary. [4]

She wrote most of her books while living in the town of Moffat, Dumfries and Galloway, Scotland. Her novels were best-sellers, with more than seven million copies printed^[3] and translations in multiple languages.^[4] Her last book was published in 1969.^[4]

Stevenson died in Edinburgh in 1973.^{[4][6]} She is buried with her husband in Moffat New Cemetery.
