

Writing Realistic Police Procedurals

All of you who are interested in realism in police dramas or protocols in real-life police action, mark your calendars for 2 PM, Saturday, September 25th, because **Fremont Area Writers**' speaker is the man with the answers. Why does Adam Plantinga think he's such an expert on the subject? Because he is.

Adam Plantinga knows more about police procedures in the real world, than almost anyone. In fact, he literally "wrote the book" on the subject. Its title is **400 Things Cops Know**. It was nominated for an Agatha, won the 2015 Silver Falchion award for best nonfiction crime reference and was hailed as "truly excellent" by author Lee Child. *The Wall Street Journal* called it "the new Bible for crime writers."

He followed that up with his second book: *Police Craft*.

Lou Fancher reported in the San Jose Mercury News that "The short essays that make up his new book, *Police Craft; What Cops Know About Crime, Community and Violence* (Quill Driver Books, \$16.95, 237 pages), cover law enforcement's most volatile topics, including use of force, special operations, death and dying, racial profiling, police and street culture, interrogation techniques, the collection and preservation of evidence and more."

Plantinga was a Milwaukee police officer from 2001 to 2008. He is currently an SFPD street sergeant and will be sharing his vast knowledge with us in a Q&A session. "Whether your questions deal with realistic portrayals of criminal investigations or the events of the past year," Plantinga said, "I'll try to answer them."

On Sunday, July 25th, I attended my first CWC Central Board meeting; it was held on zoom. I was a bit nervous being the new guy, but was pleasantly surprised to find it was much like our branch board meetings, but without the pressure of being in charge and doing the preparation that I do as president. It was interesting to witness the lively interaction of the various personalities as they challenged each other on protocol and details.

This particular gathering was rather a whirlwind of an agenda, as it was also the Election Day for the CB officers. There were three changes to the Board: Roger Lubeck is now president of CWC, Donna Rosenthal, our former president, is now vice president, and Constance Hansted is now treasurer. You will have likely see an account of the details in the most recent CWC Bulletin.

I had planned to use the recorded session to fill in specifics of the agenda, as I was spending most of my time observing instead of taking notes. (This is new to me, and I forgot that I should have been jotting down more details.) Unfortunately, the Zoom administrator forgot to record it, so we missed getting to share a remarkable speech made by Roger. Many of us from FAW heard much of his background when we attended the Zoom presentation that he recently gave on how to prepare and give professional presentations.

Some agenda items: Roger is also the leader of the MRMS review team. They are working diligently to find a potential replacement for the antiquated system we use as the statewide database. It is a formidable task and will definitely be an ongoing project. We are still planning to hold the Jack London Awards presentation inperson in Oakland on October 17th. CWC is still looking for someone to step-up and take on the Bulletin, as Rusty LeGrange has decided to step down after years of service. Please let me know if you have any interest in being of service to CWC by taking on this responsibility.

Next meeting of the CB will be held at the live event in Oakland on October 17th. If anyone has anything they want me to address with the central board, please let me know by October 13th.

Regarding policies and procedures, I have the latest changes made at the state level, and will be glad to share them as requested. We will discuss further issues that involve our FAW concerns at future Board meetings.

August Speaker Recap

BECOMING A PUBLISHED AUTHOR

From beginning to end . . . and beyond

On August 28, FAW members had the pleasure of hearing from three of our own—Chris Cook, Evelyn LaTorre and Urmila Patel. Each is taking the journey from writing to publishing and beyond, and shared with us the many experiences and lessons learned during their process. Here are some highlights from the meeting. **I**•**S**



Chris Cook shared his experience finding and working with an editor for his manuscript, a sci-fi thriller entitled *Schrödinger's Brother*. After workshopping his book with his critique group, Chris took his book to the SF Writers Conference to network with other writers, as well as, editors, agents and publishers. One of the opportunities was a sort of speed dating for writers and editors. You give an editor a page of your manuscript, they read it and give you a "Yes, I can help you," or a "No, we're not a good fit." One of the editors he talked to was Mary Rakow who does both developmental and line editing. While sci-fi is not her usual genre, she was sufficiently intrigued to want to work with him. After overcoming his initial sticker shock (\$3,000)...Rakow charges by the word...he decided that it was just something he had to do; and he's glad he did. *(continued on page 9)*

Urmila Patel had a number of obstacles to overcome in her attempts to find a publisher, one of which was a language barrier; the other was her lack of knowledge regarding the publishing process. Not to be thwarted by a lack of information, she went to Google and started researching the publishing industry. She eventually found a congenial editor, but misunderstood what he was prepared to do for her. He edited her book, **90 Days Out of Uganda**, but the rest of the publication process was left to her. Cost was an issue, so she looked at other books and using them as examples, she designed and formatted her book herself. She knew what she wanted on the cover, she had visualized it for quite a while, but didn't have the tools or the skills to create the dynamic cover she had in mind. She knew she would need to pay for professional cover design. Urmila's search led her to 99 Design and the cover she'd envisioned. *(continued on page 9)*





Evelyn LaTorre, once her first memoir, *Between Inca Walls*, was finished, decided that her time was better spent writing her second memoir. Finding a traditional publisher that would do the things she had no interest in doing, was the path to publication for her. She developed contacts through her years with FAW and other writing groups and organizations, and eventually decided to work with a local hybrid publisher, She Writes Press (SWP). Unlike traditional presses, with a hybrid press, the author pays a fee to get their work published. SWP accepted her already professionally edited manuscript and handled the parts of the pre- and post-publication process that she didn't know how to do, or want to do. SWP recommended she hire a publicist to help her with marketing and promotion. She did, and has found this person's assistance to be well worth the money. From social media, to podcasts, to book launches, Evelyn is enjoying promoting her work, especially when someone else does all the leg-work. *(continued on page 9)*

August Speaker Recap (continued)

(Chris Cook continued) Rakow asked if he had specific concerns he wanted her to address; he gave her three. Should he keep the prologue? Was there sufficient depth to his characters? Was his ending strong enough? He gave her a choice of font and font size, which she very much appreciated. Rakow read his manuscript once and then sat with it for a few weeks, before reading it a second time. The result: a 30-page write-up of comments from the editor: 11 pages of response to his three initial concerns and general developmental edits, and 19 pages of pointed comments and line edits. Chris was re-considering self-publishing, but the report with a complimentary acknowledgement of his writing skills, gave him the confidence to continue pursuing traditional publishing. **Hurdle & fix**: writing the ending to his book, his critique group bugged him to keep writing.

(*Urmila Patel continued*) Here are a few of the steps she encourages everyone to take when they're ready to publish: copyright your work before you give it to anyone to read; get an ISBN#; have a professional edit it... the cost is worth it. **Hurdle & fix:** writing her story was painful at times, so she'd take a day or two off....

(Evelyn LaTorre continued) Evelyn reminded us that two of the most important "selling points" of a book are its title and its cover. She went to the mat with her publisher over her first book's title. She won that battle. She also explained that as scary as pitch sessions can be, once you've done a few and get the hang of it, they can be fun and are critical in "selling" your book to an agent or a publisher. Hurdle & fix: organizing her material was tough, until she remembered that most writing is rewriting...her first draft didn't have to be perfect.

"I get feedback from strangers who have been bowled over by something I've written. It's like having a fan club and it feels great! It's very satisfying." Evelyn Kohl LaTorre

CORRECTIONS from speaker Kelley A. Way: August 2021 issue / June 2021 Speaker Recap

Last month's speaker Kelley Way's middle name is Anne. It was misspelled in the Recap as Ann. Apologies Kelley.

The following are points of clarification from Kelley regarding copyright, trademarks and registered trademarks:

- 1. p. 8, third paragraph from the bottom it says to search **uspto.gov** to see if something is a registered trademark or patented. This is technically correct, but patent law doesn't cover pen names. (I can't think of a reason why an author would need to look for a registered patent, though I suppose it's possible. KAW)
- 2. top of p. 9 patents don't have a symbol like trademarks and copyrights do. The TM and R marks are both for trademarks the R is for registered trademarks, the TM is for unregistered trademarks, and the C is for copyrights.



On Writing

by Steven King

If you have not already read it, Steven King's *On Writing*, (2000) is an inspirational memoir of the craft and passion of writing. To me, the must-read chapter is "Toolbox," in which he likens the writer's toolbox to the one his Uncle Oren built. It weighed 80–120 pounds. He always carried his full toolbox with him because, "It's best to have your tools with you. If you don't, you're apt to find something you didn't expect and get discouraged."

King recommends writers build their own toolbox and build up their muscles to carry it with them. In the top level, place your vocabulary and grammar. He suggests, "if some (of your tools) are rusty, clean them off." Some of my favorite quotes from this section are: "Bad grammar produces bad sentences." "Must you write complete sentences each time, every time? Perish the thought." (Note the example he provides.) "You should avoid the passive tenses"—King wrote over five paragraphs on this point. "Adverbs (those ending in -ly) are not your friend," and best: "...do as well as you can, and remember that, while to write adverbs is human, to write he said or she said is divine."

King provides book titles to improve our grammar skills. A former high school Business English teacher, he provides plenty of examples, helpful lessons, and tips. One more quote. "Words create sentences; sentences create paragraphs; sometimes paragraphs begin to breathe." Let *On Writing* breathe fresh life into your writing.

Tracks

by Robyn Davidson

Tracks: A Woman's Solo Trek Across 1700 Miles of Australian Outback (1980) is a thrilling physical and spiritual adventure undertaken by a woman on her own.

In 1977, refusing to bow to the prospect of a soul-numbing life, Davidson decided to do something very different, something "BIG but personal"—a walk across the Australian outback, from Alice Springs to the Indian Ocean, by herself. Her only companions: four camels and her dog, Diggity. At times she was joined by various indigenous people, and one pesky National Geographic photographer, who would fly in for periodic visits to document her progress.

Global interest in the "camel lady" generated by the Geographic, motivated Davidson to write *Tracks*, to explain the mystical nature of her journey and "connection to the land."

Survival in such a harsh environment was unpredictable; her trek was unprecedented. Against all advice from family, friends and strangers, this "barely-formed," 27-year-old woman braved one of the most unforgiving desert landscapes on the planet...on foot.

Davidson's stunning memoir inspired me to go on a "walkabout" of my own. Sometimes sharing another's adventure, via the written word, can be as empowering as living it yourself, motivating one to step into the unknown with unexpected confidence and certainty. Davidson's story was in the National Geographic (May 1978) and was in theaters with Mia Wasikowska and Adam Driver in 2013.



FREMONT AREA WRITERS' CORNER (Continued)

I doubt I'd have two published books that are selling well without the Fremont Area Writers. For the past eleven years, the organization has helped shape my writing life. I have loved to read and write ever since learning how as a child. But it wasn't until I collaborated with Bob Garfinkle in 2009 to get the Fremont Area Writers started, that I could see myself as a published author.

I recall when Bob, our founder and first president, had only three of us on the FAW Board. At various times over the last 12 years, when needed, I served as Secretary, Treasurer, and NorCal and CWC representative. In the beginning, we often had less than 15 members present at our pizza parlor gatherings in Centerville. Later, over 40 members could be counted on to attend at the larger DeVry University facility. Our speakers instructed me on how to write, design, and publish books. Program VPs arranged for presentations by experts like publisher Andrea Brown, editor and book judge Charlotte Cook, and the founder of a new e-book platform called Smashwords, Mark Coker.

I joined critique groups with FAW writers like Art Carey, Tish Davidson, and Nancy Curteman. They, and so many other members (most recently, Jan Salinas and Joyce Cortez) patiently read and reread my pieces about growing up in Montana and my adventures in Mexico and Peru.

In collaboration with Carol Hall, and other dedicated FAW members, I helped plan workshops by experts like Brooke Warner, Jordan Rosenfeld, and Martha Alderson. I drank in their examples of quality wordsmithing and eagerly read their books on the writing craft. Listening to authors on the National Association of Memoir Writers' monthly phone conferences, has kept me inspired. Critique workshops, with professionals like Charlotte Cook, showed me how page-turners are written. Charlotte later served as my developmental editor.

Other CWC chapters added to my ability to write prose. At a weekend retreat, sponsored by the South Bay Writers, I recognized how the numerous chapters that I'd completed could be organized. The narrative arc that appeared, surprised me. I came up with what I thought was the perfect title, *From Montana to Machu Picchu*. But it was soon changed by the publisher I discovered, She Writes Press. SWP is known for its attractive titles and eye-catching covers. My manuscript was accepted with a title change to *Between Inca Walls: A Peace Corps Memoir*.

Brooke Warner founded her hybrid publishing company (one where the author pays a fee) because as an acquisitions manager, she saw her boss decline to publish good manuscripts written by women. SWP accepted my edited manuscripts without further changes. I trusted the company's expertise to design a quality product. They would do what I didn't know how or didn't want to do. And SWP books are distributed through the same channels as traditionally published books. Brooke encourages her 800 authors to support and advise one another. I've learned that a book doesn't automatically sell, even if it is well written. Authors often must publicize their own books. SWP recommends hiring a publicist, which I've done.

Through SWP and FAW, my knowledge of the art and business of being an author has expanded 100-fold. Life in the fast lane of writing, publishing, and promoting my two books continues to be exhilarating. I am grateful to everyone who has contributed to my enjoyable writing life.


