

Living a Life of Service

Myrla's tiny stature belied the giant of service that dwelt within. If she could help, she did. Whether connecting people with services they desperately needed, as she did with seniors in the CAPS program, or making a first-timer at an FAW meeting feel at home in a room full of strangers, she was there for everyone. It was her mission.

What follows is a collection of remembrances from the FAW membership—thank you all for sharing. **(1.5)**

Myrla Garduque Raymundo: An Intense Passion for Community Service

If you know anything about Myrla Raymundo, you know that her life was dedicated to her community. Her calm, friendly demeanor covered an intense life of community service. The following list of her civic activities is prodigious, if not jarring: Union City Historian; two-time candidate for the Union City Council; President of the Friends of the Union City Library; Founder, CEO and organizer of the Union City Museum Board; promoter of the Union City Museum; writer of two histories of that town (*Union City Through the Years* and *Union City Oral History*), including a collection of substantive interviews of town minorities and settlers; Founding Member of the Fremont Area Writers branch of the California Writers Club; creator and Editor of the Fremont Area Writers *Ink Spots newsletter*; active member of Saint Anne Church in Union City; member of the *cursillo* movement (of Oakland), with numerous positions, including District Director and Editor of *The Mariposa* (a newsletter of the Filipino Community); Columnist, *Tri-City Voice* newspaper; President of the Filipino-American Association of Alameda County; and Site Coordinator for the Community Ambassador Program (CAPS) for seniors in Fremont, CA. Sometime during this very active life, she received an MBA.

I am sure there is more to this list than the activities just mentioned, but they convey a statement I found in her writing: "It feels good to be able to make other people happy." Clearly, she walked the talk. Our friend, on whom we relied so frequently, passed away on November 13th. We will miss her, but her memory will remain. She's still out there, somewhere, helping others.

November Speaker Recap

Children's Author, Illustrator & Graphic Designer: Tom Romano



om Romano started his talk with this confession, "I didn't originally set out to be a writer…maybe an artist …and an occasional artist, at that." But, years later, after many rejections and dogged persistence, he is the illustrator/author of five children's books, as well as five screenplays.

It started with his interest in endangered species. He was passionate about sharing information about these animals with children. Since then, he's written five children's books, most on this subject. He also writes screenplays; one of which is being staged as a readers' production in NYC on December 11th with possible future development as an off-Broadway play.

His first book, *Birds of Prey and Endangered Raptors* is full of wonderful black and white illustrations of various predatory birds. He queried many publishers in his attempt to get this book published. Eventually, he found a small publisher suggested by someone from one of his critique groups. It took time and hard work, but eventually, he was successful.

Another of his books, *Jeweled Travelers of the Sky*, is an "exorcism" of his behavior as a child. He was an avid collector of butterflies when he was a youngster, and killed hundreds, if not thousands, of them for his collections. In this book, he encourages his young readers to enjoy butterflies by observing them, rather than collecting them. He includes detailed illustrations of the lifecycle of some of these marvelous creatures, from colorful caterpillars to their final stage as "jeweled travelers." This book is available on Amazon.

His two most recent books are, *The Watcher in the Lighthouse*, a ghost story available in paper-back; and *Lil' Oriole in the Land of Day and Night*, starring Lil' Oriole, a young girl, tiny in stature, who rides on the back of a bird and visits animals to learn about their lives, available in hardback. Both books contain colorful illustrations by the author. Romano has also illustrated books for other authors, as well.

When asked by aspiring writers what they need to do to get started, Tom acknowledges the many fears that go along with wanting to be a published author. His recommendation: if you have an idea that you're in love with, passionate about, run with it. If you find it hard to get started, write one sentence. Then write two sentences or a paragraph...maybe next a chapter. Be prepared to work at it. Figure out what works for you.

He believes that 95% of writing and publishing a book is hard work. It took him three to four years for each of his to reach the shelves in bookstores. He's a fan of cold-calling venues to do readings of his books, and has taken copies of his books to prospective customers at bookstores, introduced himself, and showed them the books on the spot, often making a sale in the process.

His bottom lines...don't give up on the ideas you're passionate about, be persistent, and be willing to put in the work. And don't forget to join a vibrant writing community that can support your efforts.

Tom's website address is **romangraphics.net**. He's having some work done on it, so keep trying if you get a "not available" message. You'll find his books on Amazon. **(I • S)**

The **High Desert Branch of the California Writers Club (HDCWC)** will host a free presentation on "**The Hero's Journey**" with famed author Christopher Vogler on **Tuesday, Dec. 21**st, at 6:00 pm via **Zoom**. Most writers have heard of Joseph Campbell's work on the hero's journey in his book *The Hero with a Thousand Faces*. Some may have read Vogler's book, *The Writer's Journey: Mythic Structure for Storytellers*, which builds on Campbell's ideas from a writer's perspective. Now you can get personal insights through Vogler's presentation and discussion with him.

Christopher Vogler is a veteran Hollywood story consultant known the world over for his landmark work *The Writer's Journey: Mythic Structure for Storytellers*, now celebrating its 25th Anniversary Edition.

Vogler grew up in the St. Louis area, studied journalism at the University of Missouri, and began his career as a documentary filmmaker for the US Air Force's space program. After graduate studies at the USC film school, he entered the Hollywood studio system as a story analyst at 20th Century Fox. While working in the Disney story department he wrote an influential memo on the mythological Hero's Journey pattern that became part of Hollywood story legend, influenced Disney's The Lion King, and formed the foundation of his book, *The Writer's Journey*.

As a consultant, he has influenced the stories of many productions including Disney's Aladdin, Hercules, Fantasia 2000; Fox's Fight Club, The Thin Red Line, Courage Under Fire; and for others 10,000 BC, Karate Kid II, Darren Aronofsky's The Wrestler and Noah; Will Smith's Focus, Hancock, Men In Black III, I Am Legend, etc. He consults with major corporations on storytelling and branding, and presents workshops globally on the power of stories to change minds and lives.

My COVID Experience in India

Well, it wasn't I who got COVID! It was my 81-year-old bed-bound mother, in Bangalore. So, it was actually in a rush that I had to leave for India. I had to stop my subbing assignment mid-way through, AND miss my son's college graduation in Waco, TX, which was a week later.

I didn't go home to my mother's apartment as soon as I landed. I checked into a hotel, directly from the airport. Hmm.... An arrival of a different kind. By this time, my mother was already in a hospital, and her 24-hour caregiver who so kindly had taken care of her, tested COVID positive, and she was isolating in my mom's apartment. Hmm.... A different take on things this time!

My kind, benevolent uncle was doing the hectic legwork of taking care of my mother. At this time, early May, the Delta variant was ravaging India, and the environment that my uncle was exposed to was no less, around the premises of the hospital. I couldn't step out of the hotel, lest I be exposed to the virus and also fall sick. My uncle being 74 with comorbidities, was really lucky, he escaped the virus. Just imagine if he had fallen sick, I would have been in dire straits!

My experience in the hotel was tolerable. The room was clean and well maintained. But the restaurant service was awful. But the safety protocol was impeccable, which mattered to me the most. I was basically confined to the hotel room for three weeks. I used to step out once a day to have my room cleaned. How do I spend my time for three weeks without stirring out of a hotel room!

Believe it or not, I accomplished a lot! My uncle found me incredibly helpful and supportive. I was making several calls a day. By the way, it was unbelievably difficult to get a bed for my mother in a hospital with the availability of an oxygen cylinder. I got in contact with a few influential relatives, but let me tell you—influence or not, COVID wipes out your resources.

However, luck plays its part in the most unexpected of times. You could also call it God's grace. I was praying for 2 people—my uncle and my mother. 1) My uncle shouldn't fall sick and 2) my mother, being in a bed bound state, would somehow manage to look after herself in a COVID ward of 60 patients manned by 2 nurses and 1 doctor! I was praying that my mother wouldn't develop bedsores, as she has to be turned sideways periodically. By the time she got out of the hospital after eight days, she hadn't bathed and hadn't had a bowel movement. Incredibly, she survived the odds! She is a kind, com-passionate, and non-complaining woman with

an indomitable spirit and a gentle smile that could light up a hopeless world.

Meanwhile in the hotel, I had built up a daily routine for myself. Apart from preoccupying myself on what to order for my meals, also watching the cost, I got my daily bout of exercise. I would pace back and forth in my room, while listening to calming hymns. I would do this twice a day. Luckily, for me, I hadn't forgotten to pack my iPad, and got to watch some somber, yet heartwarming movies on Netflix. I can also tell you I went through a roller coaster of emotions in that hotel. The first week was especially terrible as you can imagine. And having to extend my stay for another 2 weeks (I was supposed to get out in a week), was even more frustrating.

But, even more frustrating was the restaurant service. Without getting into the details, I ended up writing a four-page complaint letter to the hotel manager. I was thrilled to put my writing skills to work:), and got very creative with my outrage! Aah! I was in no mood to write poetry, but this was the icing on the cake!:). I said goodbye to boredom in a flash:). My letter, four pages of excruciating detail, actually did catch the attention of the manager. Following that, I had great service! Large portions and just the right spice to the Indian curries.

My mother survived the COVID ordeal because she had received her double dose of vaccine, despite her age and chronic, neurological handicap. Another figment of God's grace! Ironically, a Good Samaritan in my mother's apartment building (a relative of our tenant in Bangalore) had succumbed to COVID. He was only 50. God proposes; God disposes.

I had somehow emotionally survived my 7-week stay in India. My friends in the US would reach out to me periodically. I got in touch with my friends and relatives in India. FAW also sent me kind, inquiring emails. Hugs:)

Whether COVID results in death or not, we all get through it. But, we would realize this only at the end of our ordeal. Our strengths, our pitfalls, the invisible power that leads us through this journey. There's a rebirth of hope, a renewed light, novel lessons that rain on us. I am sure the lives that COVID has taken will find themselves reborn, their spirits hovering around us, their souls very much alive. They cannot be taken from us. My mother lived for a purpose. She's had a difficult life, and it's not been an easy journey for me being her caregiver, even from afar. She's alive for a reason. Maybe I need her, and despite it all, yes I do.






