

n Saturday, August 27th at 2:00 p.m., Fremont Area Writers will host novelist Shelley Adina at its monthly Zoom meeting. Dr. Adina is the *USA Today* bestselling author of more than 50 books under four different pseudonyms, including Adina Senft, under which she writes Amish romance. In 2021, she completed her doctorate in Creative Writing at Lancaster University in the UK. Her dissertation, a 700-page creative thesis, is about Holy City, the ghost town in the Santa Cruz Mountains.

Adina is a prolific author. In May and July this year, with co-writer R.E. Scott, she has already released the first two Regent's Devices novels, a steampunk adventure trilogy set in an alt-history, Regency England and France. The third book in the series is due out in September. When Scott and Adina discovered that the historical figure Sophie Blanchard was Napoleon's real-life Chief Air Minister, planning an invasion of England by balloon, inspiration struck. A fictional daughter was invented, and her English best friend subsequently becomes the great-grandmother of the heroine of Adina's popular 22-book Magnificent Devices steampunk series.

Adina will be discussing how the "blurbs" on your book covers can result in either an immediate rejection or an instant sale. She'll explain how to use them as your opportunity to connect with the readers who are seeking books like yours. She'll be available to answer audience questions, following her presentation.

A Word from Our Editor

Welcome to our August 2022 issue of *Ink Spots*. I hope this finds you and those you love safe, healthy and happy.

August is perhaps the saddest month of the year in this country; it has a smattering of different religious holidays, but not much else (at least on my calendar). However, there is *Women's Equality Day* on the 26th. I've been thinking about ways I can celebrate women's equality and the strides we've made.

It is said that women hold up half the sky...though we often don't get recognized for it. Given the opportunity, I'm sure we could hold up the sky in its entirety, if called upon to do so. I hope some of you, women and men, will consider using your creative talents to celebrate women's equality in some written form (poetry, prose, essay, memoir, etc.). Photos and artwork on the subject will be appreciated as well. These will be featured in the September issue of Ink Spots. When asked how many women Supreme Court Justices should make up the court... Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg replied, without hesitation, "Nine!" That would certainly be an example of women's equality, considering how long there were only men on the court. Deadline is 8/10 for the September issue.

I'm revising Submission Guidelines for Ink Spots and will send this out to you before the $10^{\rm th}$. I'm doing this so you can keep it handy in case you have questions about how to prepare your submissions for publication. Very rarely have I not published a piece that's been submitted, though there have been many times when I've wondered if the writer read the instructions once listed at the bottom of this page before submitting. If you have any intention of submitting work to agents, editors, book publishers, magazines, contests, journals, etc., they will expect you to follow their submission requirements. If you don't, many of them will simply trash your submission without looking at it. They'll just move on to the next submission. They get 100s to 1,000s of submissions a year; they don't have the time to decipher work that doesn't meet even the basic criteria of their requirements. No matter how good your writing may be, they may reject you because you didn't follow directions. Let's see if we can avoid that.

Instead, get used to following guidelines, by following them for Ink Spots...this is your opportunity to practice in a friendly environment. The more you submit for publication, the more you'll learn there are industry standards that almost everyone follows, but there are also some requirements unique to specific publications. It takes some time to get used to both the common requirements, as well as the unique ones. It does matter if your goal is to become a published writer/author...following directions is a test you will have to pass over and over again.

Keep an eye out for the Ink Spots Submission Guidelines, and if you have questions about them, let's talk. We're here to help you, please give us that opportunity. Thanks to those of you who are following our guidelines!

My Humpback Whale Snorkeling Experience

I slid into the Atlantic Ocean off the small boat like a seal sliding off a rock and into the water. I heard my breathing through my snorkel and blinked while focusing on the deep blue beyond.

Suddenly, there they were, a 40-foot-long mother humpback whale with her 15-foot-long calf circling her. It was an astonishing sight. I have seen humpback whales and their antics above the water off Hawaii and California, but here was the gentle giant in her own environment.

They swam around us and our boat, eyeing us. No doubt they were curious about the ungainly creatures who literally came out of the blue. The mother and calf swam next to us, under us and so close that I knew with flick of her tail, it would be the end of me.

It was like a dream, one that would be long lost if it weren't for the pictures my small point-and-shoot underwater camera took. There were full body shots of the mother and calf, and body parts like flukes or the long pectoral fins filling the entire frame.

The largest animal I had snorkeled with before was the ocean's largest fish, a whale shark, and it was only as long as the calf! I remember counting the seconds as the whale shark swam slowly by, head-body-tail, gulping down water through its gills to filter out plankton to eat.

The calf needed to come up for air every few minutes, with mother in tow even though she could average 20 minutes per breath. The calf swam close to its mother the whole time they were with us, a good 30 minutes. They circled our boat many times. Our 25-foot-long boat paled in comparison to the mother. Female humpbacks can grow up to 50 feet long and weigh 35 tons!

Out of the water, the pair put on quite a show, tail lobbing (slapping their flukes on the surface of the water), pectoral fin slapping and breaching their whole bodies out of the water!

Intentions are powerful. The previous night while introducing ourselves (our group had all previously snorkeled with wild dolphins in the Bahamas with

Wildquest over the years) and why we were there. I shared that I wanted to see a mother and calf pair underwater, as well as write a blog post, a children's book, and an article about the experience. I'm not saying I'm solely responsible for the long and memorable encounter—the humpback whales made that happen—but considering we only got into the water once more during the week (we heard a male humpback singing underwater!), it made this encounter even more special.

Aquatic Adventures specializes in "Passive-in-Water Whale Encounters" or PIWWE (pee-wee) on the Silver Bank Marine Sanctuary, which is halfway between the Dominican Republic (where we flew to) and the Turks and Caicos islands in the Atlantic Ocean.

From Aquatic Adventure's website, "Research indicates that the Silver Bank contains the largest seasonal population of humpbacks in the North Atlantic Ocean, if not the world. The sanctuary is only 40 sq. miles, but 5000-7000 humpback whales pass through each winter."

The Silver Bank is a calving and mating ground for humpback whales. The calves grow quickly on their mother's milk of 70% fat (Whole cow's milk is only 4% fat in comparison!). They are born 10-15 feet long and 1-2 tons in weight. The mother will not feed again until she reaches somewhere north like Stellwagen Bank off Massachusetts, USA.

I want to thank everyone on the boat, guests, and crew alike, for an amazing experience in and out of the water. For more about snorkeling with humpback whales in the Silver Bank, visit

Notes from a Panel July 24th San Francisco 18th SF Writers Conference

The 18th San Francisco Writers Conference was held in-person this past July 21st to 24th after a postponement from its usual February dates. The conference hasn't been held since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. The event at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on Market Street attracted a range of hopeful-to-accomplished writers. In-depth, half-day Master Classes on Thursday and Sunday were provided by writing and publishing experts such as Jordan Rosenfeld and Brooke Warner. Scores of one-hour sessions covered a wide range of topics like "Setting, Time, and Place in Fiction Writing" to "Craft of Writing Nonfiction." The next SFWC is scheduled for February 16-19, 2023.

The California Writers Club had a colorful booth festooned with the covers of the scores of books written by its members. CWC was further represented by a panel of five authors who shared how belonging to one or several CWC branches had benefited them. FAW member, Evelyn LaTorre, was a panel member and shared the following:

"For the past 13 years CWC has helped shape my writing life through workshops, retreats, and the monthly programs of two branches: Fremont Area Writers and SF-Peninsula. I doubt I'd have two published books without them."

Just as I was feeling sorry for myself because of a physical ailment, I read this book and was whisked away from my pain into the author's.

This heartfelt and brutally honest story took me into the anguish of the Keevil family as they struggle to survive. The author fights to overcome her young husband's death, her own drug abuse, and her difficulties in raising her two daughters.

Most of the scenes take place in hospitals, therapy sessions, or driving between them. We learn about treatments that work and some that don't.

The descriptive first person narrative plunges the reader into the emotions of this young wife and mother as she attempts to take care of her dying husband, her failing brother, and her young daughters. The book is sometimes difficult to get through, but worth it.



For us, his siblings...no borrowing was the golden rule and don't even think about it, was the final word. My other brother didn't even dare to ask...he was banned from any possible consideration and he had no chance. Oh, No! I could not believe that this restriction was real! My mother had taught me that everything has a solution.

I patiently waited and waited until my brother came out of his dream come true phase...then I began to prepare for the moment of conquering this almost impossible goal. The site has never been excavated. Who knows what lies below the surface?


FAW member Paul K Davis will be making a presentation on the history of Ukraine to Big History Society on Monday, August 22nd, at 10:00 AM, via Zoom.

But I wonder if this site maybe created a legend. The broken top slab looks as if a huge, and very tough, sword sliced it. Perhaps people figured the sword got stuck in the stone, and could only be pulled out by one specially blessed. Hence, Excalibur.

SCARS

Some scars are invisible but powerful nonetheless. Because they can't be seen, no sympathy is offered, no concerning questions asked.

But what happens when you are told that your scars will be easily seen? Do you have the procedure or not?

That's the choice I faced when I investigated cosmetic surgery after losing eighty pounds.

The scars on my arms would run down the backside. They might fade with time or they might remain as deep red lines. I didn't care. I hated the flaps of saggy skin that smacked the water when I swam, so loudly that I could hear the whump, whump as the bags smacked the surface, despite wearing earplugs and a cap.

I believed that if I could hear it that clearly, then so could everyone else.

I hated the way my arms looked in short sleeves: huge bags of quivering flesh. I was embarrassed and humiliated; my self-esteem suffered.

The surgery would remove the bags. I chose self-esteem over scarring.

After recovering from that operation I investigated additional cosmetic surgery to remove the roll of skin

that had pooled around my waist. Even though it was always hidden under my clothes, unless I wore an overly baggy top, the bulge was visible.

Once again the surgeon said there would be scarring, most likely a deep red line that encircled my waist. My response? I told her that the only one who would see it was my husband. The benefit of the operation would be clearly visible: no roll of excess skin.

Granted my scars are visible, but the surgery removed the psychological effects caused by extreme embarrassment, by my disgust of my body.

After recovery, every time I looked in the mirror, I was shocked. Who was this woman looking back at me? She had no flabby arms, no roll of skin.

My new identity was hard to embrace. Months went by and I still did not recognize myself, did not connect that reflection with who I was now.

Two years later I am still surprised. The scars are there, but they are badges of honor, not of shame.
