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### A Word from Our Editor

Welcome to our October 2022 issue of *Ink Spots*. I hope this finds you and those you love safe, healthy and happy. I trust you are busy writing!

I've developed a new "bad" habit...bingeing TV shows provided to me by various streaming services. Of late, I've been hooked on Acorn, a service that floods my living room with shows produced in Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and Canada...all the "English speaking" countries...except America. Every day, the non-American English accents from around the world fill my ears, and I cannot pull myself away. (Just can't get enough. I've even given my cell phone's Siri an Australian accent.) Of course, all these shows have beautiful scenery, which makes me hunger to be there and not here, but that's a story for another time, perhaps. Yes, I know, we have beautiful scenery here, too.

**800 Words** is the name of my current guilty pleasure. The title refers to the word count, George, the main character, a writer, produces for his magazine column. Every column, no matter the topic, is always exactly 800 words. The topic is always something that's going on in his life, and the lives of those a-

round him. He uses the column to process those topics that he is wrestling with, and that most of us confront during our lifetimes: friendship, jealousy, death, love, relationships, lies, forgiveness, changes of all sorts.... If you like slice-of-life "dramedies," you might find this interesting, as well as entertaining. One might argue that it's an Aussie/Kiwi take on "soap operas" without the alien abduction and the evil twin that no one knew existed.

If you write, and submit your writing for publication, you deal with word count—usually, a minimum and maximum word count. In George's case, the 800 word limit is self-imposed. As I've binged my way to the waning episodes of the third season, George has suddenly exceeded his limit of 800 words and has not attempted to edit back to 800. He has changed, and presumably, so too has his need for constraint. He's become more flexible.

As writers, we do need to adhere to word count requirements. But we are often given some leeway with a min., as well as a max. I have to admit, though, the concept of picking a single number and adhering to that is intriguing. I think I may try this. It would certainly be a form of self-discipline that one could perhaps use to encourage oneself to sit down and write when one feels blocked or resistant. If I choose to try this, I'll let you know how it goes. (ng)

If you have more than one submission for the Writers Corner, or more than one Book Review, send one email but indicate the number of submissions with the type of submission—Writers Corner (2) or Book Reviews (5) in the appropriate field on your email's Subject line. ### **Butterflies That Won't Let Go**

The caterpillar spins a cocoon to morph into a beautiful butterfly. When the air gets warm and it's time to break out into freedom, the butterfly emerges from its cocoon and gingerly climbs to a sunny spot to rest and let the sun warm its wings until it's strong enough to take flight. Without warning, there it goes—nothing to hold it back. Trusting nature, it flies into the spring air in search of nectar.

In the spring of 2020, the COVID virus forced us to cocoon in our homes as it spread like a raging wildfire across the globe. By mid-March 2020, just before the official date of Spring, we were told we should not leave our homes except for essential trips—should not visit friends or family, or have contact with anyone over the age of 65. This left our seniors, many already sequestered, even more isolated and alone. Our friends, families, and hardest of all, our grandparents were sick and dying, all denied the comfort of their families as they faced a horrifying end. Hundreds of thousands have died here and millions worldwide, and the pandemic is not over.

One year later, we have three emergency use vaccines that we are trying to get into peoples' arms as fast as we can. Some of us rushed to get it, while some of us have refused completely, and still others are waiting to see how things go with the early vaxxed before they'll make up their minds.

Like the caterpillar waiting to transform into a butterfly before releasing itself into its "new normal" experience, many of us have stayed isolated in our cocoons. Unlike the caterpillar, who actually is transforming physically into a "new normal," we're still living in the same body (unless we've gained or lost weight, cut and/or dyed our own hair, tried changing our eating habits, or taken up indoor exercise, etc.). We've sacrificed so much: we've sheltered in place; left, and in some cases, lost our jobs; lost our homes; waited hours on food lines; given up contact with almost everyone; we've masked up; we've socially distanced; we bump elbows instead of shaking hands; and heaven help us if we hug each other. We've put up with scarcity and carried on with life over Zoom. Many of us are sleeping longer and benefiting from it less; and some of us have developed depression and new forms of stress related symptoms. Meanwhile, the caterpillar, oblivious in its cocoon, is transforming into a butterfly.

We've given up our "normal" lives and tried to create something called a "new normal" that defies description. Because we're all snowflakes, no two of us are exactly alike, so our new "normals" won't be the same either. Some of us may be very far from normal.

On top of all of this, we're suffering through unnecessary confusion. Unlike the caterpillar, none of us has any guarantee that when we finally leave our cocoons, we'll have the equivalent of shiny new wings to show off to our friends and family. Instead, it's more likely that we'll struggle to get back to a normal that no longer exists. It may take some time until we realize we must create a new normal we're reasonably happy with. Anyone want to bet that our wardrobes will be decidedly more comfortable than they were before we stayed home for more than a year.

What exactly is the future going to look like? No one can possibly know "exactly" what the world will be like when COVID is either gone, or more likely, at least under control. The future's unknown. However, it can be predicted, though we know that no prediction will ever be 100% correct.

The caterpillar is a creature of instinct, it creates a cocoon, and it hangs around while its body turns to goo and then reassembles itself into a butterfly. It allows this new body to gather strength, and then off it flies in search of food. It probably doesn't give much thought to its new normal or its old normal. Can you imagine if it did? 'Whoa, this is cool, I've got wings. I wonder what they're for. Maybe they have something to do with my new normal. Wait a minute! What happened to all my hair and where are my feet? What happened to my old normal? Somebody's got some splain' to do.' Nope, the butterfly lets go and flies away.

So, should we continue to wear a mask, shelter in place, socially distance, continue to wash our hands and use hand sanitizer, and only hang out with those who've been vaccinated, to help stave off the new variants—be a butterfly who won't let go...maybe for good reason? Or, do we trust science, the government, medical professionals, and the vaccines that so many of us want others to get. It's up to each of us. Our choice. Your choice, and mine.

Keep living...and keep loving each other.



# The Art of Logic in an Illogical World

#### by Eugenia Cheng

This is an amazing book. From the cover you might think it a boring recitation of logical principles with denunciation of our culture for being so illogical. But the author does not just have a PhD in mathematics, she is also a concert pianist on the staff of the Art Institute of Chicago. She successfully explains mathematical logic for the average person, minimizing symbolic notation, thoroughly explaining the notation she uses, and providing her examples from the real world.

I'm sure you won't find her examples in any math book in Texas or Florida. They include: is it useful to identify the race of a suspect (answer, yes if there's no more than about 10 people in that category, but otherwise of little value); does meeting a Chinese mathematician (such as herself) provide evidence that Chinese people are especially mathematically able (answer, no, and meeting a Canada goose provides as much information about the mathematical ability of Chinese); and why is it illogical to respond to "Black Lives Matter" with "All Lives Matter" (read the book to find out).

I bought the book on a whim at Banter Bookshop, not knowing how delightful it would turn out to be. I highly recommend it.



### **Cultivating Community**

To cultivate the community feeling craved by most human beings, it is essential to deepen relationships beyond the superficial "How's the weather?" level. Forging a connection with neighbors requires working and socializing together. Establishing common interests begins those deeper, more satisfying relationships. Sharing the tasks of daily living is a wonderful way to lighten workloads and become part of a larger, more intimate community. That is what is happening in the Mission Peak Village Cohousing project in Fremont. Over the past few years, Mission Peak Cohousers together have:

- discovered common interests and had fun through recreational activities such as hiking and picnicking
- learned how to make decisions using consensus
- helped one another with childcare
- collaborated on errand-running
- shared their garden produce
- cooked for the group via monthly meals together (before COVID)
- carpooled to interesting local events
- brought meals to members undergoing medical treatments
- navigated city building requirements
- celebrated holidays and important community milestones
- helped a member with her book launch
- learned more than we would have researching topics on our own

These activities have facilitated the cultivation of relationships among Mission Peak Village members prior to them moving into their new homes. Relationships begin to deepen as soon as a potential member signs on as a Mission Peak Village Explorer. Trust builds as the network of cohousers works together to incorporate new members.

Actions speak louder than words! Working closely with one another ensures the well-being of the group and is a wonderful way to foster a strong sense of community. Cohousers can pool resources like lawnmowers, clothes washers, and cars. They also share a few duties such as periodically making a meal in the common dining hall or gardening and weeding in the common outdoor areas. Networking continues as they design the buildings (i.e., common areas and individually owned units) together. The expertise of cohousing consultants provides greater knowledge of how to advance such a large building project. Members' know-how in different areas culminates in better decisions than if those choices were to be undertaken alone. When the group encounters unanticipated obstacles, solving the problems together creates a bond.

Working for the good of a group is not for everyone, but those who have become part of this cohousing network of sharing, rarely decide to leave their chosen communities. Members of the 180 US cohousing projects in existence and the 140 in the planning stages, desire the benefits this cooperative way of living brings and wouldn't live any other way.

Mission Peak Village unveiled its design at a free celebratory presentation on September 17<sup>th</sup> at Fremont's Downtown Event Center. To see more information and view images of the community check out the website: **www.missionpeakcohousing.org**.


