





Two Reports from Evelyn LaTorre —

California Writers Club Biannual Meeting Report

The biannual meeting of the California Writers Club was held on Sunday, July 23. (The meeting was on Zoom, so I attended from Santa Fe, N.Mex. where I was visiting my four siblings.)

All 22 branches of the organization saw attendance at their meetings drop during the pandemic when all meetings were held online. Since then, most branches are meeting in person. The membership count of many CWC groups has increased by offering readings to children and adults in schools, libraries, and bookshops. Also, articles in local newspapers (thank you Tish, Knuti and Nancy) and new outreach to communities have helped boost the total CWC membership to 2,000.

CWC's finances were a major topic of the three-hour meeting. The publication and mailing costs for the last issue of the *Literary Review* consumed a full 30% of the club's budget. Alternative, less expensive ways of having our writing published, are being explored.

Two Ina Coolbrith awards were unanimously approved for Carol Bumpus, previous NorCal President, and Sandy Moffett, SoCal leader and CWC Membership chair. Their awards, as well as 22 Jack London awards (one for our own Scott Davidson) for service to branches will be presented in person at CWC's annual meeting at the Holiday Inn on Sunday, October 22.

Branch representatives exchanged lists of good presenters. The list has been given to our VP Knuti VanHoven to consider for future FAW general meeting speakers.

September's NorCal Conference Up-date

The September 24th in-person conference for branch leaders, "A New Era for NorCal Branches and Writers" will have workshops on finding and retaining members, strategies that work for keeping volunteers, and ways to market our branches and our writing.

In honor of the state-declared California Writers Week, October 16 to 23, Fremont Area Writers will have a display for the month of October of their books at the entrance to Fremont's Main Library. (*Please contact Evelyn at* **elatorre@aol.com** *to have a copy of your published work included in the display.*)

How Comedy Works with David Misch

Comedy writing is sometimes compared to songwriting: in music, every note is important; in comedy, every word, even every *syllable* can be critical.

There are many classes about writing funny; this one is about what funny *is* – its mechanics, its principles. Comedy people take them seriously and refer to them and so should anyone who wants to write comedy.

This talk has no direct instruction, but rather takes a deep dive into the comedy principles which are, in fact, the basic principles of *every* art form: tension and resolution, pattern disruption, misdirection, and surprise. And we'll see how these principles achieve their effects by looking at examples ranging from Buster Keaton to Richard Pryor to Amy Schumer.

Palm Beach

I ran across Mary Adkins in a writing webinar and I wanted to compare her writing skill to her teaching ability. Palm Beach is, overall, an enjoyable piece of women's fiction.

Rebecca is a freelance journalist in New York City. Her favorite subjects are corruption and wealth inequality.

As a new mom, Rebecca juggles work and motherhood. Mickey, her husband, is an actor/singer who has lost his voice. A rich client he's catered for between acting gigs hires him at a six-figure salary, as house manager for his home in Florida. They move to Palm Beach, Florida. Soon, another of Palm Beach's wealthy elite offers him a job at twice the salary. Rebecca objects to his working for the "vulture" capitalist who buys failing local newspapers to dismantle and discard them. Mickey takes the job anyway.

After the first chapter, the story slows down while she provides a little too much background information—the place setting and the main characters, their mindsets, and Rebecca's hot-button issue that follows her through the story.

The pace picks up, the characters come alive, and an interesting story ensues. Rebecca's moral compass is challenged more than once and we see how she maneuvers through those, and how her optics change.

Multiple subplots layered in, enrich the story. Ghost-writing the memoir of Mickey's employer's wife—an interesting character in her own right—stresses their marriage further. A family hardship, an ex-boyfriend, and Mickey must endure a conflict of his own.

Everything crashes down around them, until they lose the stability they thought they had. Adkins provides a satisfying feel-good ending.

At 297 pages, the book is well written. Try skimming the second chapter, latching onto the clear key points. Beyond a few other protracted backstory fillers, it's



a fast-paced, interesting read. Adkins includes little chuckles along the way and a storyline the reader won't see coming.

Sensitivity warning: The "F" word is used. Not on every page, but on quite a few.

Dancing Naked Under the Moon

Alissa attends a court-mandated anger support group for pulling the plug on an uncooperative fax machine at work, then using it as a trampoline, holding a chair over her head and threatening those around her. Oops, that last happened in her support group. But an unfaithful husband who gives you an STD and asks you to sign divorce papers so he can marry the woman he impregnated, will do that to you. At her sister's insistence, she agrees to move home until she figures her life out.

So she starts Prozac and packing, to arrive in San Jose and her new condo. Her sister and mom assist and annoy her. Her best friend, Kathleen—Ethel to her Lucy, Shirley to her Laverne, Martha Stewart to her Ally McBeal—helps any way she can.

Her journey involves humor and humanity. Add some spice with the arresting detective of her first new client, a daycare teacher/stripper/vigilante with the best of intentions. She fantasizes about, but resists the detective, while finding her new place within her family and the world. The heat level with her detective elevates midway through the story. It hits a crescendo about three quarters of the way through. Although the heat rises outside the bedroom door, and the door remains ajar, bedroom activity is private.

Solving the Dementia Problem

(Note: I wrote this essay for a dinner party I attended recently. Billed as "a salon of brilliant and (semi) original thinkers," our assignment was — come to the dinner with a particular problem to solve. Everyone would get a chance to share their thinking and explain how they would solve the problem they'd chosen. Solutions could be either funny or serious. There was an attached list of about forty problems to consider, including "dementia." This was my chosen topic.)

This essay addresses the problem, generally termed dementia, of gradual loss of mental ability, often associated with aging; not the problem of sudden loss of mental ability at any age, associated with discussing politics or religion.

Human bodies and minds eventually wear out, suddenly or gradually. Sudden problems, usually the result of accident or disease, tend to affect both body and mind, or affect body in such a way as to disable or kill the mind in turn. However, gradually developing problems may affect the body or mind separately. Thus, as we get older, some of us lose our minds before our bodies.

Our culture has been progressively accepting physical disabilities, and accommodating for them. We use canes, walkers, wheel chairs, eyeglasses, hearing aids, and much more.

The solution to the dementia problem is the same, to accept it and accommodate it.

This can take many forms. Those of us who solved differential equations in college may now have to be content with solving quadratic equations. We may eventually need to be content with arithmetic, or just being able to count.

The key is to find those abilities that remain, and emphasize them. I am told that music is one of the last abilities to go, so join a choir, or if the vocal cords are also getting old, go to more concerts.

Clearly, as either physical or mental abilities decline, or both, it is good to have a loving life partner. We can help each other on and off with clothes, and explain what has been spoken but not understood. And occasionally we will need to phone 911 when unable to pick the partner up off the floor.

But, maintaining an intimate partner is made difficult by the fact that, at least in our culture, women live longer than men. Apparently, with age, it would be good if bisexual women tilted more toward lesbianism, but bisexual men tilted more toward heterosexuality. Even so, some polygamy may be needed, with women sharing the dwindling number of remaining men. This may become easier as it becomes more difficult to remember who our partner is or what they look like.

At some point each of us is likely to lose our physical ability to drive, or our mental ability to remember how to get home. This problem is already being dealt with by the proliferation of retirement communities. Some of these are designed around golf courses, which seems a bit dangerous to me.

I'd rather have one designed around a music or theater venue. In general, it would be good to have a variety, so each of us can choose one which emphasizes our remaining abilities.

It does occur to me that some nudist retirement communities might be good, so that those who become unable to dress, or simply forget to put clothing on, will not feel embarrassed or cause offense.

I hope these various suggestions are helpful. Again, my paradigm is to accept dementia and accommodate it. Emphasize the remaining abilities, both in yourself and in others. Just forget about the abilities which have been lost.

An Open Letter to Brock Purdy

I have a sign by my fireplace that reads "We Interrupt this Marriage for Football Season." Most people think it's for my husband, but it's for me, the wife. I've been a diehard 49ers fan since the 80s, and like many, I thought this year was our chance for the Super Bowl.

And then there was that fateful day, January 29, 2023, when you, Brock Purdy of the 49ers, took that hit. I couldn't believe it. Simply couldn't believe it. My world came crashing down. Everything clouded over, because like millions of other fans, I was devastated—and so scared for you. Nothing seemed real.

But minutes later, when the edge of the television screen got blurry, life got weirder still.

A quick call to my daughter, a child neurology resident in Rochester, New York, confirmed my worst fears. I was having a stroke.

I found out later that my left internal carotid artery had jammed up. In an instant, the blood supply to the left side of my head was gone.

Like someone thumbing through a flipchart, only fleeting memories remain. In the ER, everything was cloudy and jumbled. My words tripped over each other. I'll never forget my absolute terror when I stared stupidly at the clerk and blanked on my birthdate. There was the stinging jab of a clot-buster. Everywhere they took me, the comforting, sanitizing aroma of alcohol was in the air.

I said yes to everything I was asked. Like a nodding taxi doll, every option sounded absolutely perfect. If someone had suggested head removal, I'd likely have acquiesced. The shock and disbelief on my husband Tim's face played back as I was loaded into an ambulance to Sutter in Sacramento.

I'll never forget the concern and kind words of the young man who sat with me in the ambulance as the siren blared. He did his best to keep me engaged and awake. On that terrifying ride, he would never know just how much I appreciated this intense connection with another human, while everything I knew to be true or real was gradually slipping away—vanishing from my consciousness.

Other vivid images remain—the solemn faces of the team of blue-coated doctors who faced me at the hospital. Their voices were hushed, but they did their best to reassure me. A smiling nurse shaved my left thigh and I learned that a tube was going to be placed into my femoral vein. The speech therapist asked me to repeat, "Babababa… kakakaka". She smiled back at me, so I knew I must be doing it right.

A short time later, I was profoundly relieved to hear that I *didn't* need my skull cracked open and emergency brain surgery. Hallelujah to that!

Miraculously, I learned that my *collateral vessels*—a bunch of other blood vessels—jumped into action to nourish the poor starved brain cells on the left side of my brain. This intrepid collection of fetal blood vessels and other "spare" vessels, was recruited to play their part for my recovery. They blazed through triumphantly, in a symphony of support, without hesitation.

There were casualties. I'm pretty sure several million brain cells keeled over and called it quits. But, thank goodness we're endowed with a few billion spares!

Three weeks after the stroke I couldn't figure out what a cup was, except that it was something used to measure flour. I had to ask where jam would be stored, finally deducing that it was made of fruit so would probably be in the refrigerator. Simple computation such as subtraction was difficult and digits such as "9" somehow morphed into other numbers. For example, 9:30 somehow became 5:30, making scheduling my patients tricky (yes, I'm a physician). The notes on the open page of my Mozart sonata had morphed into hieroglyphics. I now played piano like a kindergartener with tears rolling down my face. That was hard. It was like I lost a part of myself, Brock. Lost part of my identity. Like I was suddenly stripped of a skill I owned—that no one had but me.

Brock, you tore your ulnar collateral ligament, and shortly after that, my left internal carotid artery clogged up. But this world we live in is a caring world inhabited by beautiful, skilled, selfless people with hearts full of love. They are our collaterals. Like my hardworking vessels, our collaterals stepped forward without hesitation in our time of greatest need. Isn't it wonderful that we both benefitted from the wonderful collaboration of hundreds of skilled humans, all waiting in the wings to help out?

Everyone from my ambulance driver to the neurosurgeons to the hospital dietician, who made sure I had a low-sugar menu, to the cheery man who swept around my bed daily. Those are my heroes. They jumped in without hesitation to put me back together and support me. I can play piano again, Brock, thanks to my collaterals.

You know what, Brock? I think we're going to make it.
