

The Phone Booth at the Edge of the World

by Laura Imai Messina Translated from the Italian by Lucy Rand

Family, disaster, death, grief—grief consuming, life continuing—but what is life when life is consumed by the death of dear ones? These are the issues underlying Messina's unusual novel which takes place in the years after the terrible 2011 tsunami that killed one-tenth of the population of Otsuchi, Japan.

"Eventually the bodies were found and Yui stopped looking at the sea." Yui, our protagonist, lost her daughter and mother in the tsunami, and when their bodies were found, they were *locked in an embrace*, this phrase, I believe, a metaphor of the time-bind placed on a person who loses a loved one. To me, Messina is a master at using structural and physical descriptions as literary devices.

Yui now hosts a radio show in Tokyo. During one of her shows, a caller talks about a phone booth in Bell Guardia which is in the area where the tsunami hit. The telephone inside the booth is unconnected to anything, but people who have lost loved ones come to call and talk to them. When a caller on Yui's radio show tells how he spoke to his dead wife on the Bell Guardia wind phone, we learn that he felt himself "becoming the person I was before."

Curious, but barely hopeful, Yui travels to Bell Guardia, where she meets Takeshi. This man has come to talk to his dead wife about their young daughter, mute since her mother was killed in the storm. And, while Yui herself, never does talk on the phone, she begins to drive regularly to Bell Guardia with Takeshi. Eventually—of course, you know what's going to happen—they become close friends. Yui bonds with Takeshi's daughter and grief begins loosening its hold, so that Yui is able to love again.

The story moves very slowly—to me, symbolic of the pace of healing—but I kept reading on, not only because it was my monthly book group's choice, but also because Messina's prose is so beautiful. Plus, I was curious how she got away with all the "no-no's" frowned

Beautiful Writers

Oh no, another inspirational book. A friend likes to send me gifts like this. Someone had given her the book. She liked it, so she bought one for me, too. I'm a lucky friend. I reciprocate with craft books. But I don't need inspiration, I need time,—quiet time, a stretch of time, without the tug of I should be doing laundry or whatever else—to edit. And, a heaping dose of self-confidence wouldn't hurt. And, a cure for Imposter Syndrome. Maybe she has confused my delay in finishing my book as a lack of inspiration. It's not.

Written by a college dropout who put six commas in every sentence and went on to write, co-author, and ghostwrite eleven books (two New York Times best-sellers), 40 magazine articles, and host one of the world's top writing podcasts, she writes of not only her own struggle to get where she is, but she includes the stories of other writers who've "made it." Like Anne Lamott, Lee Child, Patricia Cornwell, Dean Koontz, Dr. Jane Goodall, and Deepak Chopra. They've been there, as well.

Usually, when books include inserts—those big grey boxes of text on the side—they're a nuisance. I often leave those for later. This is not that. She's integrated them such that they fit right in, and they're part of the flow of text. Often, I didn't notice the insert of another author's story had ended and hers had resumed.

Inspiration and fellow-author experiences run through the first 140 pages with many truisms. Part Two gets into seeking support and accountability, and how to shorten the learning curve, on productivity, mindset, and energy hacks. Then she gets into Beautiful Book Proposals. In Part Three, she lets loose on rejection, comparison, Hook 'em Narratives, and Editing. Part Four is on Birthing the Baby.

If what you need is inspiration, this is a great book for that. It's nice to know Patricia Cornwell has four "practice" books. "I'm a slow learner, but I hang in there."

upon in my writer's workshops, her maddening, omniscient POV, constant telling rather than showing, and interrupting her story with lists. But she does get away with all of it, because all of it is necessary to recreate the slow, fractured pace of metabolizing grief into growth and contrasting complex interior worlds with

the mundane, outside world of things.

I highly recommend this book for a leisurely vacation, to enjoy a long flight across 10 time zones, and to satisfy curiosity about how this talented writer gets away with everything she does.
