

What to Expect from Your ILLUSTRATOR with Agy Wilson

gy Wilson, artist-illustrator-writer, will share "What to Expect from Your Illustrator" at the monthly membership meeting on January 27. Many of you will have seen her artwork—she is the artist/illustrator of FAW member Penny Cole's children's books. We have Penny to thank for referring us to her.

Agy grew up with lots of time to draw and lots of paper to draw on, thanks to her father who was a paper coating engineer and kept her well supplied. But, as she grew older, people kept telling her she could never make a living as an artist. This left her with the determination *not* to grow up.

Instead of running away to the circus, she ran away to the Portland Art School, now known as Maine College of Art, where she studied with a wide variety of artists. Still nothing felt quite like the right fit. She explored in many fields trying to find her place in the art world. She has been a teacher, worked in bronze foundries as a wax artist, as an egg artist creating Ukrainian Easter eggs, and as a painter of endangered species for the Wilde-N-Wonderful Gallery at Busch Gardens in Florida.

Then came the idea to combine it all. The result—a career writing and illustrating for children. Over the past thirty years she has published books both traditionally and independently, designed covers, created coloring books, worked on graphic novels, studied calligraphy, and dabbled in horology (the study or science of measuring time; the art or study of making devices for telling time). She is even thinking of trying her hand at podcasting. Lucky for Penny and the rest of us, Agy didn't listen to the naysayers and proved them wrong.

FAW will accept your entries from now until **Thursday, February 15, at 5:00 pm PT**. All submissions should be sent to our FAW president, Terry Tosh at **toshmanii@yahoo.com**. Please put **CWC Literary Review Submission** in the subject line of your email and attach your submission(s) to the email. Please include your name in your email. **DO NOT** put your name on your actual submission.

Please follow the submission guidelines as instructed in the email that you received from Mike Apodaca. (*Please do not include your name on your work, but leave space for it.*)

If you need a replacement copy of the *Lit Review* guidelines, email Terry Tosh, at the email above, and request it. The entries received by the deadline will be reviewed and blind-judged anonymously. One poem and one piece of prose will be chosen from those submitted for consideration, to represent the best of our branch's writing.

The selected work will be submitted by FAW to the CWC submissions coordinator following CWC's submission parameters.

Good Luck to all of you who choose to participate in this year's contest. Please consider this your opportunity to make our branch proud. Those entries that do not make it into the *2024 Lit Review* may be submitted to *Ink Spots* for future publication, if they have not already been published there.

A sinister-looking fortified bunker, with concertina wire and warning signs posted at every corner, but no guards and no dogs. "That was easy," he muttered to himself. Suddenly, a siren began to sound. A red light at the entrance of the Gravel Gertie was spinning at high RPMs...a loudspeaker blaring a call to arms. The sound of the K9 was getting closer. He was running and scaling fences.

Even at a young age, Bill had an adventurist spirit. So, it makes sense that he would grow up to become a Navy Seal. He survived experiences a mere mortal man would not have.

"I AM RUSSIAN" My Trip to Russia

In June 1994, I went to Russia to save the world. Groups of activists from Tri-Valley CAREs (Communities Against a Radioactive Environment) in Livermore, Oakland, San Francisco and New Mexico, flew into Moscow. We were met by our Russian activist counterparts also dedicated to conversion of their laboratories from nuclear weapons to peaceful environmental science.

We were overjoyed to meet these enthusiastic people and tour their city in an old rented bus. Through the dingy windows we saw ancient and modern buildings facing the busy streets, crisscrossed with electric cables overhead. The Bolshoi Theater, Parliament, Kremlin (still blackened in the middle by a recent bomb from a protester), and large ornate mansions overshadowed by gold and vermillion onion towers glistened in the mid-day sun.

One of the Russian activists shouted excitedly and pointed down a street to a neon sign with golden arches and vertical letters—McDonald's. Our bus lurched along barely stopping at traffic lights dangling in the middle of intersections. The lanes painted in faded white lines were ignored by most of the cars and trucks crowding to a stop, their engines revving eager for the green light, so they could jockey to the front of the line. The exhaust fumes burned our eyes.

We crossed a bridge, and the beautiful St Basel's Cathedral loomed ahead, much larger than I had realized from photos. Slowing, we turned into a parking section nearby. Everyone rushed to get a better look. Our guides said we could walk around Red Square to see the many historical buildings. I remembered seeing newsreels as a child, of Russian troops, tanks, missiles and armaments displayed proudly in the same Square.

A temporary fence was set up on one side of the wide entrance not connected to the red brick gate of a wall around the ancient kremlin. The building was used on special occasions for dignitaries visiting Moscow. There were two guards standing at attention on either side of the gate, rifles over their shoulder and high helmets that were like pictures I'd seen of guards in England for the Queen Mother.

Most of our group had walked away from me as I juggled my camera and decided to walk through the small opening at the end of the fence near the gate, to catch up with them. I glanced at one of the guards and continued to walk toward the opening. I heard a male voice speaking in Russian and knew he was trying to get my attention. I pretended not to hear and didn't stop. As I neared the opening, the guard stepped down to my level and spoke—commanding me to stop. I couldn't ignore him any longer and noticed his rifle tightly gripped. I stopped and motioned toward my group that was several yards away by that time. He shook his head and pointed with his hand to go around. Even though I couldn't understand his words, it was clear what he wanted. I smiled and turned around.

I had to hurry to catch up with our group who were noticing what was happening and were motioning to me. Marylia Kelly, our Executive Director of Tri-Valley CAREs, our leader and organizer of our Russian trip, smiled at me as I approached. "What were you thinking, challenging that guard, Jo Ann?"

"I was trying to take a short-cut to you guys," I said.

She laughed and put her arm around my shoulder as we walked together with the rest of the group.

"It would have been hard to tell a judge they shouldn't hold you in jail. That you were from an antinuclear weapons group from America." We all laughed, including our Russian friends as our translator explained what had happened.

I couldn't take my eyes off St Basel's Cathedral. I wanted to go inside, but it was closed for repair. The many onion towers had designs and colors that looked like new; some of the tower tips were gold. It was magnificent. Our tour guide explained that it had been built for the common people of Russia next to the ornate Kremlin that was just for the wealthy and walled off. I was busy taking lots of pictures.

The large cobblestones of the square were easy to walk on and we took our time. One building was the tomb of Lenin. It had large Cyrillic letters across the top with his name. I was learning to read Cyrillic and understood it. I could also read the Roman numeral dates on the many statues we saw.

Evening approached and our guides said we needed to have dinner in the famous Wedding Cake Hotel. The building had several stories, each smaller toward the top making it look like the layers of a wedding cake, they said. I took a photo of it and had to use two exposures because it was so tall I couldn't get it all on one.

The dining area was crowded with people loudly chattering away, so we had to shout at each other. Of course, we couldn't read the menu and had to get a member from an organization from San Francisco who was part of our group, to help us decide what to eat. He was fluent in Russian and we were grateful for his help. We decided on a type of stew that's baked in a round stone pot with a small opening on top. Each of us was served with our own pot on a large heated plate. It was delicious: with mushrooms and chunks of beef, vegetables, and onions in a dark brown sauce. We were able to pay for our dinner with American money, but our Russian-speaking friend explained that when we got to our destination, he would go to the post office and get Russian money for us.

After dinner, we traveled overnight on the famous Transcontinental Railway to Nizhny Novgorod, our final destination, hundreds of miles away.
