

# Mastering Multiple Points Of View in Fiction

with Guest Speaker

# LYNDSEY ELLIS



oint of view (POV) can be confusing for some of us. What is it and how many points of view are there? Quite a few, actually. While we may not realize it, movies and TV have exposed us to shifting points of view. Books tend to maintain a single point of view, though more and more authors are playing with POV, with surprising results. Author Lyndsey Ellis is going to help us better understand this aspect of the writing craft.

Using different perspectives to build characters in your stories can stretch creative muscles, but the result—when done effectively—is worthwhile. This foundational technique requires settling into several outlooks authentically by imagining, listening and inventing outside of one's own lived experience or belief system.

Mastering Multiple Points of View in Fiction gives instruction on writing from the viewpoints of several characters without diffusing a story's plot or confusing readers. The talk offers a close look at classic texts in fiction that involve multiple perspectives, along with a brief, targeted writing exercise, and Q&As to follow.

Lyndsey Ellis is a writer, editor and teaching artist who crafts speculative fiction and longform essays that explore regional history, as well as intergenerational dynamics, in the Midwest. Author of *Bone Broth*, her work also appears in *The New York Times, Kweli Journal, Shondaland, Narratively, Catapult, The Rumpus, Literary Hub, Electric Literature*, and several anthologies. Ellis has been a recipient of the Friends of American Writers Literature Award, San Francisco Foundation's Joseph Henry Jackson Literary Award, Barbara Deming Memorial Fund, Washington University's Inaugural Heartland Journalism Fellowship, and an artist support grant from the Regional Arts Commission St. Louis. She's an online instructor at Gotham Writers Workshop and the founder of Show-Me Stories, LLC., a literary consulting resource that helps new writers develop their ideas into full projects. # President's Message

Welcome to October. I'll start by blowing your mind by not mentioning either Halloween or pumpkin spice anything. I will mention the Contests and Submissions page on our website at <a href="https://cwc-fremontareawriters.org/contests-and-submissions/">https://cwc-fremontareawriters.org/contests-and-submissions/</a>. This page has new places to send your writing, both submission requests and contests. Most of them will appear in <code>Ink Spots</code>, but you can get a start on some without waiting for the next issue. I'll send you new entries, but on an opt-in basis. I know your mailbox is full enough. If you are interested, drop me a note at <code>scottfrombayside@yahoo.com</code>, or just respond to one of my emails.

Unless you've taken to hiding in a hole (and I couldn't blame you these

days), you'll have seen an ocean of articles about AI. Jane Cleland, our August speaker, talked about it. I've been following AI since my first AI class in 1971. That class discussed research projects which are now things you use every day, like route generation in Google Maps. The AI we have today seems (but isn't) a lot more intelligent. And it affects writers a lot. I've received AI-generated books to judge (awful) as well as AI-generated technical papers (even worse.)

If you are interested in or worried about AI, I encourage you to try it out. Go to chatgpt.com. It is free for the basic plan, and all you need to do is type what you want the AI to do for you. (This is called the prompt.) For instance, you can type "write a story about a yeti meeting the Loch Ness monster." See what it comes up with.

What can you get out of this? Bragging rights – you can tell your friends "I used AI." You won't get a story worth sending anywhere but the bit bucket. But the story is useful for something. Reading bad writing helps in teaching yourself what not to do. AI generated writing is bad. I bet it will seem bad to you, so it will be educational to analyze it and see what is wrong. For instance, the story it created about the yeti and monster was shallow, unlike Loch Ness. Cute, but definitely a first draft.

One excellent thing— there is no one there to feel bad when you say their writing is not the best. So, give it a shot.




# CWC / FAW California Writers Week

# Pseudoscience

#### by Lydia Kang, MD and Nate Pedersen

People have believed in a lot of silly and stupid things over the ages. Pseudoscience is a light-hearted look at some of them. The authors quote the dictionary that pseudoscience is "a system of theories, assumptions and methods erroneously regarded as scientific." You'd think, with our advanced understanding of the world and of science, we'd give up these beliefs. You'd be wrong.

Kang and Pedersen present 25 examples of pseudoscience. Some are funny, like the World Ice Theory and Lawsonomy, which states that the universe is run by suction and pressure. Some are dangerous to the health of the planet, like climate change denial. Some are holdovers from times before the real explanation was known, such as belief in a flat earth or astrology, some tried to explain real phenomena not yet understood, such as spontaneous human combustion and the Bermuda Triangle. And some are outright frauds, like crop circles, gasoline pills, levitation, and the belief that we never went to the moon.

The structure of each section is as follows. They start with an example of the pseudoscience in action. Then a history of the belief is given, often right up to the present. Then they show why the belief is not and often can't be true.

Let's take the perpetual motion machine as an example. Charles Redheffer appeared with one in Philadelphia in 1813. When it was shown in New York, Robert Fulton, inventor of the steamboat and an excellent mechanical engineer, was suspicious. The machine ran unsteadily, odd for a mechanical device. Fulton challenged Redheffer about the machine, and Redheffer accepted. Fulton removed some boards from the wall near the machine to reveal a cord attached to it. He followed the cord and found a bearded man unsteadily cranking away with one hand while trying to eat lunch with the other. Now we know the machine can't possibly work because of the law of Conservation of Energy.

Pseudoscience is a fast read and will teach you lots of things. I've read a lot of pseudoscience debunking, but Lawsonomy was new to me. I wish they were a bit more rigorous in describing why some of the items are impossible, but perhaps that would make the book too technical. I would have included Atlantis and vaccine denial in place of Lawsonomy and World Ice Theory, but that just shows maybe a sequel is in order.

### You Could Make This Place Beautiful

#### by Maggie Smith

This book's unorthodox memoir format could only be carried out by a well-known poet. Ms. Smith has won two Academy of American Poets prizes and the Pushcart Prize. In place of chapter titles, are essays, poems, and quotes from other poets and writers—each one receiving a title that introduces a topic about her 18-year relationship, in semi-chronological order. Beautifully-written metaphors and poetic descriptions float by every few pages. Most essays are two pages, some one page, and a few pages contain one sentence. Two of the author's most famous poems, "Good Bones," and "Bride," grace the pages.

From the beginning, the author clarifies, "This isn't a tell-all..." because she doesn't know why her marriage of 16 years and two children unraveled. She can only report how it affected her and began a downward spiral after finding a pinecone.

Evident throughout the 309 pages, is that Smith's pain is deep, as is her love for her young children. She worries how the separation and divorce affects them. We see her utter devastation as we live through the stages before, during, and after her marriage. Through her poetic words, the reader feels the joys and sorrows of her, and our, lives.

# The Dutch Orphan

#### by Ellen Keith

What I like about good historical novels is how real they can make an era. It's not a history lesson, but a page out of the life of people who lived during that time. It's touchable—a way to feel what they felt living through the experience. This is what Ellen Keith has done with *The Dutch Orphan*.

The story is of two sisters, close before Nazi Germany invades the Netherlands. Not a place I've read about the effects of WWII before. Lines are drawn and relationships change. Who can you trust? Even in your own family. Are you part of the Resistance or will you do what's in your own best interest to survive? Whatever the cost to others.

Both sisters are torn by their own secrets. One feels she can't share her troubles and must stand with her husband, whether she likes it or not. The other sister dares not share her secret with anyone. Lives are at stake. One sister betrays the other, with devastating result. In the end, can the sisters repair the damage done to their relationship while their country rebuilds after the war?

Keith adds an historical note that many of the events that happen in the book are inspired by true occurrences. She stays true to the war's timelines, with minor exceptions to fit the story. There are 388 pages in paper-back format.

I'll be looking for *The Dutch Wife* in my local Used Book store on future visits.

# **A** Marriage at Sea

#### by Sophie Elmhirst

This book riveted me from the first scene. In the middle of the Pacific Ocean, the tail of a sperm whale fighting for its life, whacks and sinks the 31-foot boat of an unusually paired English couple. The super negative husband, Maurice, and his amazingly positive wife, Maralyn, had quit their jobs months before, hoping to spend their lives sailing the oceans. Maurice, timid and uncomfortable conversing with people, saw no need to have a radio transmitter on board. "I'll navigate like the ancient mariners using my wits and the stars," he said. Practical Maralyn fills the boat with containers of fresh water, tins of protein, books, and their diaries.

When the whale destroys their boat, the couple manages to inflate their five-foot life raft and salvage a portion of their supplies and the dinghy they tie behind the raft. But with no motor or radio, they are at the mercy of the tumultuous Pacific Ocean. They sight ship after ship, but none pick them up, maybe because their flares don't light. The couple floats helplessly for nearly four months living on the bounty of ocean fish, rainwater, and their considerable wits. By working together—they survive. An amazing true story.

# Handling the Truth in Memoir

When writing about real people in negative ways, there are different perspectives. Memoirist Anne LaMott says, "If people wanted you to write more warmly about them, they should have behaved better." Lawyers say authors can be sued for making false statements about a living person when the memoir causes serious damage to another's reputation. A *private* party must demonstrate that the writer was purposely negligent. A *public* figure must show the writer had malicious intent.

I wrote my first memoir, *Between Inca Walls*, about a boyfriend in the 1960s. During the writing, it became apparent to me that he was probably gay. If I published my observations, I risked "outing" him. I wasn't sure what to do. I decided to be direct. I met my colleague for lunch to discuss what I suspected. He verified my description and gave me permission to publish what I'd written.

Another issue in writing memoir is that people often experience the same moment or conversation differently. Say the memoirist exposes more about their subject's bad conduct than that person wants. Exaggeration can be claimed, but if it's true, it's not legally actionable. What's written needs to reflect the author's *emotional* truth. Dialogue need not be stated verbatim. However, the writer risks hurt feelings, reputational harm, loss of trust, and alienation. Those who write about their trauma may purposely write unkind things. It takes courage to share a difficult truth and accept the negative consequences.

The memoirist's objective is to convey universal truths that resonate with readers, rather than writing about bad conduct for retaliation or exposure. I sent chapters I wrote to friends and relatives prior to publishing narratives about them. One or two didn't want their names used, which I honored. However, most wished I'd written more about them!

Individuals have varying levels of desired privacy and sensitivity. I am very open about my life, but my husband is very private and didn't want me to write about him. I teased him. "You don't want anyone to reveal even something as benign as the color of your socks!" Both my memoirs contain a great deal about my husband, though not the color of the socks he wears. I couldn't leave him out of stories about my life, but I also didn't want to alienate him. In the end, we compromised. I changed his name.

In summary, when writing about others, consult with the named person, change names or otherwise disguise the identity when necessary, and write your emotional truth. In general, consider the personal, social, and professional consequences. Then write honestly, with compassion—even though misbehavior is so much more interesting to read and write about.
