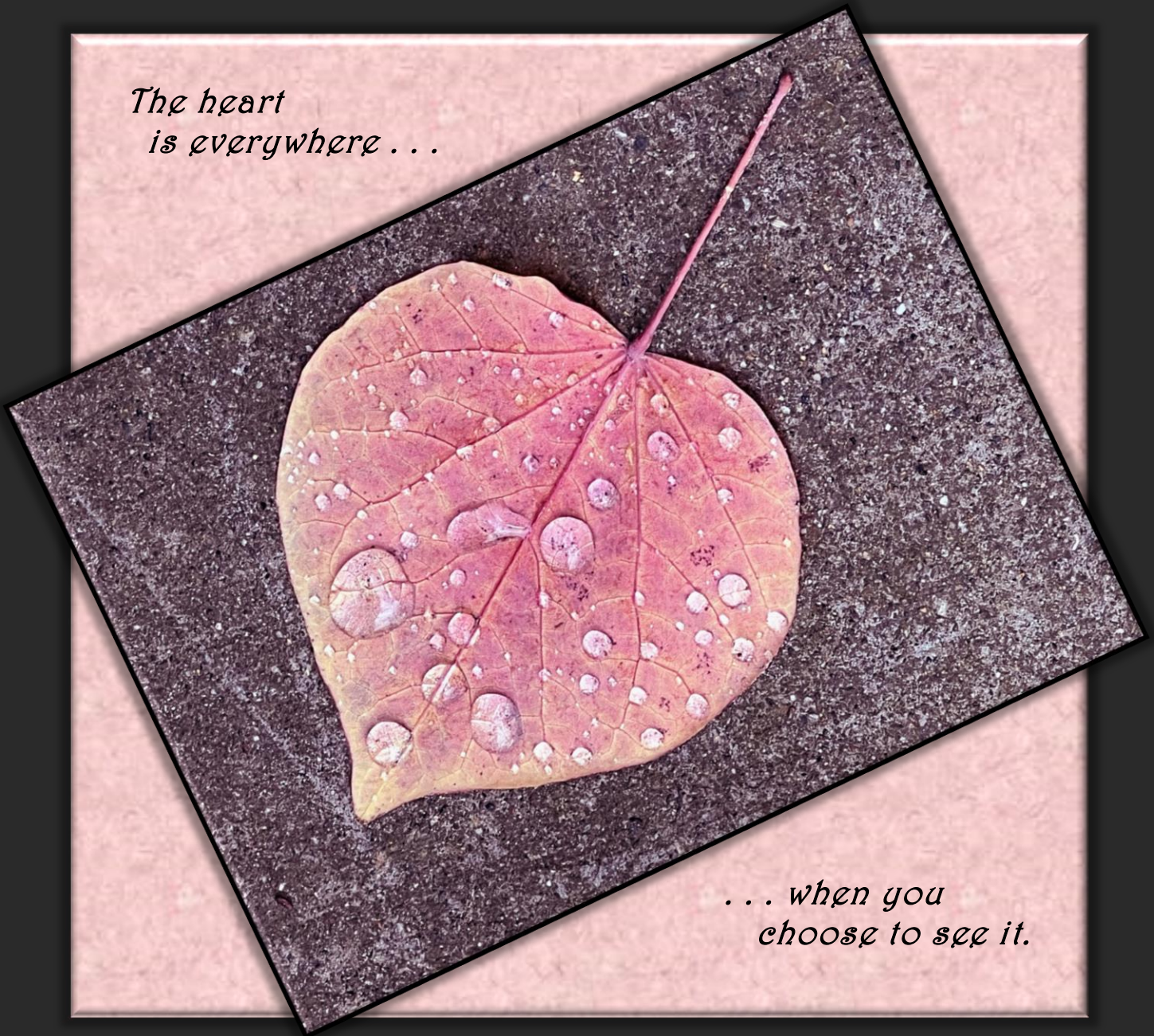

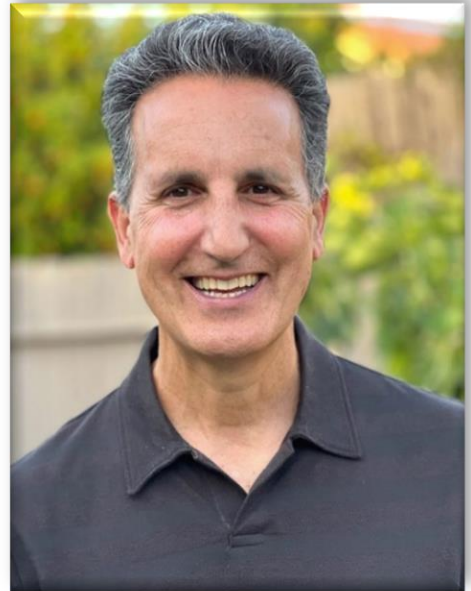

KILLER OPENINGS: *Starting Your First Chapter off with a BANG!*

with Guest Speaker

RICH AMOOI



There are many tips and techniques writers can learn and use in crafting a story. Perhaps one of the most difficult is the opening. It is, after all, the beginning. If you don't grab your reader's attention with your first few sentences or paragraphs, they will likely never make it to the end of your first chapter. If openings give you the "willies" and make you wish you hadn't listened to your muse when it whispered, "Write!" fear not, help is on the way. Award-winning, best-selling author of romantic comedies, Rich Amooi has some suggestions that might just make you fall in love with openings.

Rich has planned a presentation to help you understand how to craft "killer openings," followed by an interactive workshop to help support you in writing an opening that keeps your readers reading. Attendees are encouraged to bring the first few lines of their work-in-progress. After the presentation, participants can share their work for analysis. First lines will be looked at by those in attendance and workshopped to offer improvements, if needed.

Rich Amooi is a Readers' Favorite Gold Medal Recipient, TaleFlick Discovery winner, a Holt Medallion Finalist for Best Contemporary Romance, and the bestselling author of twenty-six romantic comedies, including *It's Not PMS, It's You*; *Dying to Meet You*; and *Ice Ice Maybe*.

A former radio personality and wedding DJ, Rich now writes romantic comedies full-time in San Diego, California, and is happily married to a Spanish Princess. He believes in silliness, infinite possibilities, donuts, gratitude, laughter, and happily ever after.

I've kept them for 50 years, and I'm glad I have them.

Today we would have been texting, emailing, or Zooming with each other. Better in some ways, but writing a letter forces you to focus your thoughts. So, even if you see the one you love every day, think about writing a letter to them. It's something they can keep.

If you're a moon watcher, (I'm looking at you, Bob Garfinkle) take note: the moon will be full on the 1st. Lots of full moon energy this weekend. The Lunar New Year will be celebrated by many on the 17th—this new moon will bless us with introspective energy during the inky darkness of no moon. This year Lunar New Year and Ramadan share the same day. Ramadan is the ninth month, from crescent moon to crescent moon, of the Islamic calendar. It is observed worldwide as a month of fasting (sawm), communal prayer (salah),

reflection, and community. Lots more online.

Interesting how Lincoln and Washington are the only two presidents whose birthday's we acknowledge, but we only really celebrate them, (...and maybe all the other presidents mushed together?) on Presidents' Day (the third Monday of the month). I'll bet most of us are just happy to have a three-day weekend to take advantage of all the great Presidents' Day sales.

Punxsutawney Phil, the weather prognosticating groundhog, thinks it's hilarious that humans believe he/she can predict how much more winter there will be on the 2nd of February. As absurd as this event is, we just don't seem to be able to quit it. I doubt the groundhog cares whether it sees its shadow or not. It's got better things to think about and do.

Valentine's Day! Frilly cards, flowers, decadent chocolates in heart-shaped boxes, fancy dinners, chilled champagne, sparkly bling...why would anyone not want to celebrate Valentine's Day? Of course, letting someone know that you love them, and showing them that love, shouldn't be limited to just one day a year. Quite the opposite, perhaps it should be expressed every day of the year. But that's a lot of cards, flowers and chocolate!

A RECOMMENDATION: Check out HAY HOUSE (hayhouse.com)! Last week I took part in a FREE event, the Writers' Boot Camp, presented by Hay House publishing. The event was 2 hours-a-day for four days (M-Th), with the option to pay to upgrade to VIP status, allowing you to participate in additional intensive workshops leading to a polished proposal which participants could then submit as part of a contest, with a \$10K advance, to have your manuscript published. There were also "vendor booths" that participants were encouraged to check out and replays of each day's webinar. This was a soup-to-nuts experience from getting started on your manuscript to choosing the type of publishing path to take: self-pub, hybrid or traditional, and everything in between. The different types of editing, and how much it's likely to cost, were covered. Guest speakers talked about their writing journeys and offered suggestions about how to deal with writer's block and the obstacles that keep us from ever getting started. They're even experimenting with AI and how writers can use it to their best advantage.

Hay House, while not as well-known as Penguin Random House, Colliers, Hachette, HarperCollins, Simon & Schuster, and MacMillan, has published over 15,000 authors, 100's of whom have made the NYTimes Best-sellers list. Perhaps you've heard of some of them: Deepak Chopra, Dr. Wayne Dyer, Louise Hay, Mel Robbins.... While once known as a self-help, spirituality and new age publisher, they are now publishing fiction as well.

Highlights of the 2025 FAW Membership Survey Results

ROOMMAID

This is a cute, clever, uncomplicated romance. It's an enjoyable read when you need a feel-good book.

Madison, a rich girl rebelling against parents who control everything in her life, wants independence, no matter the cost. She becomes a teacher and stays on a friend's couch until she can manage on her own. In exchange for cleaning and keeping a dog company in the apartment owner's absence, she's offered a wonderful room in a penthouse apartment. Pampered all her life, she doesn't know the first thing about cleaning or anything else for that matter. She'll fake it until she makes it, she decides. He's gone much of the time on travel, so he'll never know the mistakes she makes, right? She makes plenty of them.

Oh yeah, and he's mind-meltingly hot. He's had to take out a restraining order on one infatuated female, and women fall over themselves around him, so one ground rule is they can be friends, but no more. You can guess how that works out.

The bedroom door is closed in this clean tale, but there's plenty of sexual angst to keep things interesting.

One note: she uses a lot of cliches, but it seems fitting, somehow, for this character and story. You'll forgive her, eventually.

SOME BRIGHT NOWHERE

by Ann Packer

Claire, in stage four of her eight-year battle against cancer, requests that Eliot, her devoted husband of nearly four decades, no longer provide her daily care. Instead, she chooses two close women friends to live with her in her final months. Mystified, Eliot is sent to live at one of the friend's homes and a tug-of-war between girlfriends and spouse begins. The couple's adult children, Abby and Josh, puzzled by this new arrangement, have Eliot return to his house when they visit.

Eliot is deeply hurt when Josh and others describe him as "a boring blob." He finds creative ways to express himself through development of his culinary skills, and continues to insist that he's the best one to take care of his fading wife. However, he admits that women are natural nurturers and practitioners of easy intimacy, which he is not. A crisis ensues that brings a panoply of emotions for everyone.

I rarely shed tears when reading a book, but they came this time from the poignant metaphors and from feeling the emotions of the dying and their caretakers. This deep dive into grief is recommended for those who wish to understand the complexity of feelings evoked by their own or loved ones' eventual passing.

The expression on my face matches the look women give men when they figure out something that would have been obvious to any woman.

"But it's been three months since . . . why didn't you tell me?"

"My girlfriends all say you will leave me when you go. Lots of Vietnamese girls with abandoned American children." Tremors twitch on my face as I watch Howa'd's eyes for the unmasked moment of his true feelings before he can conceal them.

"I love you, Lin."

I do not detect falsehood in his gaze. "I love you, too, Howa'd."

Rather than make up in the washroom, where I've just been sick, we move out into the hallway. As Howa'd hugged me, he says, "We can't go on as if nothing has happened. We'll get married in an allied country, then the authorities will have no choice but to allow me to see you, and then you'll be able to come to the States as my wife."

"We're only staying one day to get married," Howa'd states.

The officer says, "I call American MP."

The agent blows a whistle, and Howa'd grabs me and begins breaking through the lines. I attempt to help. Howa'd loses control when he sees them hitting me and starts swinging wildly. The MPs come running and beat us both with clubs, not sparing my pregnant belly.

We are arrested. Howa'd is confined aboard a US Navy ship of the coast of Vietnam. I am returned to the hospital.

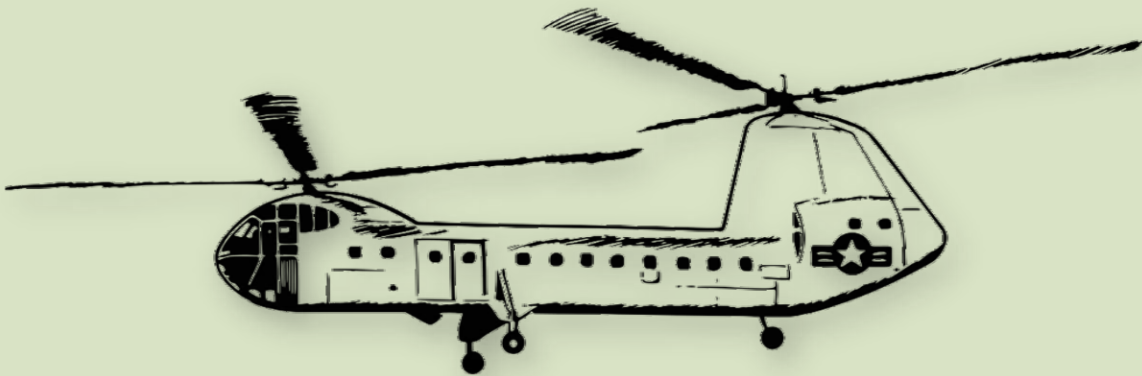
The thudding of the rotors deafens the cries, screams and shouts. I huddle with Howa'd, and we both kissed our baby.
